Budge And Austin Display Form In Reaching Finals At Wimbledon Tourny

(By Sooty Reston, Associated Press Sports Writer) WIMBLEDON, England, June 29—Don Budge and Fred Perry scampered into the finals of the All-England tennis championships today. Then Wimbledon turned its attention to tomorrow's semi-finals in the women's section of the tournament.

Austin, reaching the zenith of his form, eliminated Germany's Henner Henkel in just 55 minutes, 6-2, 6-4, 6-0. Budge followed his English stylist on the centre court and thrashed Ferenc Puncoc of Yugoslavia 6-2, 6-1, 6-4. Budge hasn't dropped a set in this tournament and hasn't lost in major competition since Fred Perry beat him in the 1938 United States' finals.

Canucks Blank Summer side Red Sox 20-0

They were practically the same team that held the Island junior champions to a 3-2 loss in 11 innings in Charlottetown last August but certainly looked far from it last night.
