HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To repair a badly torn lace curtain. Tack tissue paper over the hole in the lace, slacken the tension of the sewing machine, then cover the paper with rows of stitching across and across. Tear the paper gently away when finished.

THE COOK'S CORNER

ORANGE MARMALADE. Slice very thinly one large orange and one lemon. Measure the fruit, and to each cup of fruit add three cups of cold water. Set away for twenty-four hours in a cool place. Then bring to a boil and boil briskly for ten minutes. Set away for another twenty-four hours in a cool place. Measure the mixture again and to each cup of it add one cup of white sugar and one extra cup of water until it drops like jelly from the spoon. This makes five to seven glasses of marmalade.

GINGER SNAPS. One cup molasses. Bring to a boil. Stir in 1 tablespoon soda. While still foaming pour 1 egg beaten well, then add 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup shortening, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Mix well, and add 1 tablespoon of vinegar and a little salt. Work in enough flour to make stiff. Roll very thin. Bake on greased pan.
