\$1,374 SEWN IN CLOTHES

CHICAGO, April 17.—Thomas Connelly got right with God today. He committed a burglary that netted him \$400. He was seventy-two years old, a ragged, unkempt wanderer when he died on the way to the County Jail. He was not a professional, and his sin weighed on him. The burglary was committed twenty years ago. He left a letter to a Catholic priest just before he died.

"For the love of God, father, find Anna Jane Gallagher, of Escanaba, a woman with brown hair," he wrote. "I stole \$400 and a beautiful prayer book. I sold the jewelry and got some goods and started to peddle and I made money, and now I am dying and I want to pay back this money, for I sold all her things—only her prayer book—and I saved it. I want to get right with God. Give her the money sewn in my clothes.

The clothes held \$1,374. The woman was found in Escanaba, and in the Probate Court today was given the money. Connelly had \$2,500 more in a bank for which no heir was found.

GOOD FISHING.—Herring have struck in at Charlottetown harbor. Schools of fish were noticed off Connelly's Wharf Thursday morning and some men who noticed them quickly got out some nets and made some fine catches. Among those who made some hauls were Messrs. Ed. Stanley, John White and George Gallant. In their boat they caught 375 fish after being out but a short time and the same men this morning succeeded in a short time in filling two barrels. The fishing is being carried on about 100 yards off Connelly's breastwork.

PRO-CATHEDRAL.—Extensive repairs are being made to the Pro-Cathedral under the master hand of Mr. Michael Walsh. The steps leading to the front door have been neatly repaired and new posts set in. A new set of steps will be placed on the west end, over the entrance to the basement, and will lead into a vestibule six feet by 9 feet. On the south side there will be a new vestry built, 18 ft. by 9 ft. This will be on the property of Judge Blanchard who has very kindly allowed the committee the privilege of using his land for this purpose.

FEARS FOR WM. MURPHY.—The Halifax Herald of April 18 contains the following:—Dispatches to the Plant line convey the fear that William Murphy was drowned from the Halifax prior to her departure from Key West. Murphy, who is nineteen years old and has served for some time as second mate on the board of the Halifax, had been missing several days when the steamer left on the homeward voyage. Nothing was found to explain his disappearance save his cap, which was discovered on the water. Murphy belonged to Charlottetown. He is a son of Mr. James Murphy, Hensley St. and was at one time employed in the Drug Store of A. W. Reddin.
