A plane from Paul's Flying Service landed on the ice Monday morning to take to Charlottetown Miss Ruth Clements, Mr. Charles Stewart and Mr. Kenneth Clements.

Work on the reconstruction of the Poole & Thompson wharf is continuing apace with quite a number of piles already having been driven in preparation for stringers. Working in sub-zero temperature the men have already completed a substantial portion of this very difficult work. It is expected that by spring break-up, this preliminary work will have been completed, and work started on laying the rest of the new wharf.

Travel on the winter ice is now at its height with trucks, cars and horses going to and from Montague, Georgetown, and Lower Montague. Although the river has not been busted, travel to these points is not in the least curtailed. It has proved a very means for transportation of produce to different points, and of logs to the mills. Many long strings of horse drawn sleighs may be seen on the ice almost every day, bringing in logs and other produce. It is unfortunate that the river is no longer busted as in former years, however, it is possible that in future years this old time method of marking the ice trail will again be employed for the convenience of travellers.—Lan.

The Sunday evening service in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague was in charge of the Young People's Society with the past president, Mr. Douglas Nicholson acting as leader. The theme of the service was "Faith" and the message was divided into three parts: first, "the object of faith"; second, "the character of faith"; by Miss Thelma Larter, and third, "The Purpose of Faith" by Mrs. N. D. Nicholson. The hymns, under the direction of the choir leader, Mr. J. E. Dunning, were "I Walked for the Lord", "Simply Trusting every Day", "O For a Faith That Will Not Shrink", "Just As I Am" and "Faith of our Fathers". The beautiful anthem, "He Will Be There" by Lowe, was sung by the choir. The first scripture lesson was read by Mrs. S. D. Reid and the second by Mr. John Shaw. Mrs. R. D. MacLean led in

prayer, followed by the Lord's Prayer in unison. The church organist, Mrs. A. F. Campbell, presided at the organ.

Ice houses in this district are now being packed with ice in preparation for the summer season, and ice men are sawing ice at different points on the river. Last year considerable ice was removed from the river and the dam. This year a greater quantity is being removed. Although the weather is still relatively cold, the ice men fear the spring breakup within a few weeks, and are making haste in getting their ice in storage before it arrives. However, at present it seems as if the warm weather will not arrive for some time, for on Monday the roads were again blocked by drifting snow, and bus schedules to Charlottetown had to be cancelled, necessitating travel by rail or plane. The plows expect to clear the main highway by afternoon, and the main by-roads later. It has been noticed that the wing plow from Charlottetown has cut down the high banks of snow along the roadside thereby increasing visibility which is much appreciated by motorists. This year has proved to be the greatest test for snow removal equipment and they have met the test admirably by keeping the road open to the city with only a few days on which travel was impossible. With the return of the "old-fashioned" winter, it is hoped that blower plows will be installed on the main highways next year so that the main artery may be kept open.

On Saturday night the Murray Harbour Black Hawks defeated the Reserve Army by the score of 5-2. From the opening whistle the Reserve Army strove mightily to break through the Black Hawk defences, but each attack was countered by the tight defence work and net guarding. The game was very fast on fast ice, and the large crowd enjoyed an interesting game of hockey. At times body-checking was severe, but penalties were passed out by the referee. At the conclusion of the Montague-Georgetown series for the Southern Kings Taylor's Jewellers Trophy, it is understood that Murray Harbour will engage the winner in a final series for the trophy.

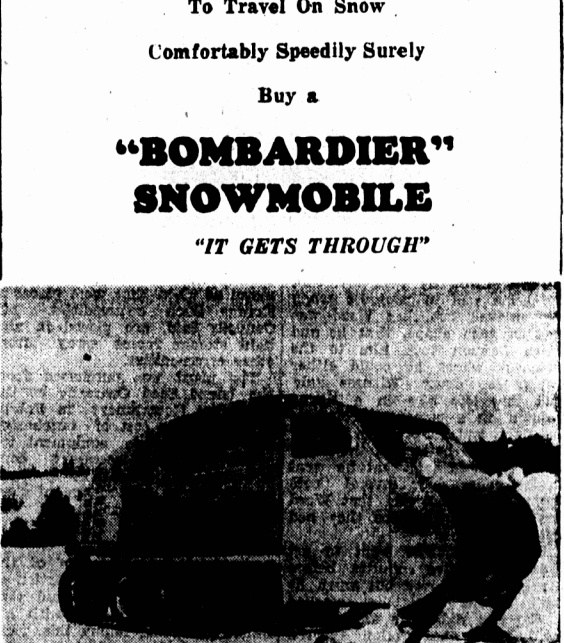
