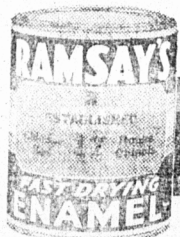

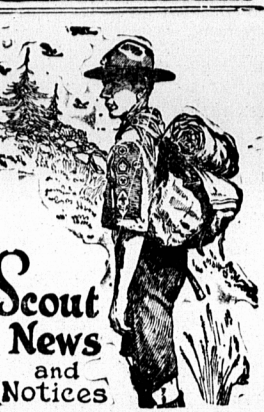

R. A. F. Crews Give Lives To Wreck Bridge
LONDON, May 22 - (CP) - This is the story correspondents with the Royal Air Force in France sent back today: - Eighteen R. A. F. bombers tried to destroy a German bridge, but failed.
Then the pilots and crews of four bombers went to their commanding officer with the request, "Can we British it off?"
The permission was given.
The four bombers took off.
They returned but the bridge was destroyed.

Britain Tightens Home Defence In New Moves
LONDON, May 22 - (CP) - The government today placed new restrictions on foreigners within the United Kingdom amid a general tightening up of defence against the possibility of attack at home. Thousands of volunteers continued to join the new corps of anti-parachute sharpshooters.
Precautionary moves included: - 1. The Home Office ordered all foreigners to hand over to the government any firearms they may have.
2. A special committee opened a review of the position of 3,500 German and Austrian women who have been living in Britain at liberty but under certain restrictions.
3. Sailors on Netherlands ships which brought refugees to Britain were forbidden to leave their ships. It was believed some Nazi "fifth column" elements might have joined these ships.
Arms and ammunition for the corps of "parashooters" to be stored at selected spots throughout the British Isles it was stated and military authorities have accepted an offer by the association to place its patrol cars and telephone stations along highways at the disposal of the corps.
It was announced that all refugees from the low countries are being closely questioned before admission to Britain in order to weed out persons suspected of being Nazi sympathizers. A number of Dutch crewmen were reported detained by police.
