FOURBER P. E. ISLANDER — The Country Gentleman says: "More than a dozen new varieties of Irish potatoes developed in recent years are results of potato-breeding work by Dr. Frederick J. Stevenson, of the Plant Industry Station at Beltsville, Maryland. These improved varieties have added millions of bushels to production. One third of all certified seed potatoes planted in 1944 will be of new varieties developed" by Stevenson and his associates in cooperation with thirty state experiment stations. One of the most popular new potatoes is its Sebago, another the Katahdin, described by Stevenson as "the most remarkable potato variety in the world." Late in December 46,000 new seed potato seedlings grow from roots, not tubers. Any one of these is selected to be raised and sold. A native of Prince Edward Island Stevenson says his was practically raised in a potato field.
