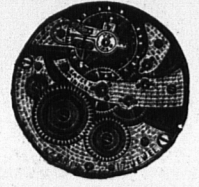

RUSSIAN RECRUITS IN CANADA SELDOM FAIL TO PASS MEDICAL TEST.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 15.—The medical officers who are examining recruits for the overseas say that as much smaller proportion of Russians fail to pass the medical test than do the native Canadians, or those from Great Britain, in fact it is very seldom that a Russian cannot pass the doc-

tor. Their teeth as a rule seem to be better than the other Canadians, and their eyesight as a rule is considerably stronger than that of English-speaking recruits of French Canadians. This is probably due to the fact that the Russians as a rule work in the open air and do not strain their eyes to the extent those working in offices do. Most of the English-speaking Canadians enlisting have worked to a great extent at least indoors.

MALES TOLD BY MEN IN THE FIGHTING LINES ON LAND AND ON SEA

CALL FOR STRETCHER BEARERS

An officer writing from the front says:

Our first two companies had no casualties at the outset, but the third had hardly cleared their trench when the call came for stretcher bearers. Nearly a dozen men had gone down. Some of them were beyond our aid, but the wounded were carried at once into the shelter of a trench and attended to. One cannot speak too highly of the work of the stretcher bearers. During the whole period of the attack they exposed themselves with the utmost fearlessness and their only thought was for the safety of the wounded. They had often a considerable distance to carry their burdens, but not one of them confessed to weariness till their task was done. The worst case they brought in at that point was a fine young fellow who was wounded in three places. The case was hopeless, he died, while at his own request, we were permitted to give him a cup of water meant much to some of them, and to change their position a little, so that their wounds hurt less, was gratefully acknowledged. And they seemed glad to have someone near them when the shells threatened their trail protection.

FIREWORKS

We had to wait for some time. Our safest position was behind some sand bags, and lying there we witnessed the most extraordinary exhibition of fireworks one could see. Our guns had almost ceased firing, and the enemy had it all their own way for a time, and we lay for over an hour under every kind of shell they could pour on us. For the suggestion of fiendish malignity, one must, I think, award the prize to the shells. High explosives given one the impression of power out of control. One of them took a tree in our front and levelled it at a stroke like a giant woodman run amok, and it was always the sheer strength of them that impressed one most. But the shrapnel! We heard it sweep up towards us with the rush of a whirlwind and then it struck with a crash, sending the tiles in pieces from the outhouses and covering us with the blossoms of the apple trees. Sometimes one burst immediately beyond us, flinging up the earth in our faces—as we turned from it the smoke breaking from the shell in a ball, and comprising itself into fantastic shapes as it expanded. We were glad when they did burst beyond us, for the charge goes forward. Altogether it was a hot time.

One impression stands clearly out from among the experiences of those days—it is the heroic spirit of the wounded. Time and again when speaking to them on the field and at the field ambulances I heard the remark, "I came out to do my bit," and though the doing of it entailed much suffering, it was borne without complaint. There was no thought of doing anything heroic; it was just part of the day's work, and whatever the day brought they accepted it quietly. If it be true that the distinguishing mark of a real heroism is that it is unconscious of itself, these men possess it in the highest degree. One could not help feeling in the presence of their brave, patient endurance that while such men rally to the colors the welfare of the country is in safe keeping.

TO "DEAR OLIVE."

A little schoolgirl at Ilminster has received a letter from James H. Watson, of the Princess Patricia's, written in a convalescent camp, thanking her for a marked egg contributed by her to a collection made at the infants' school, for wounded sailors and soldiers. The letter is as follows: "Dear Olive, I have just finished breakfast and enjoyed your egg very much, and must thank you for being so kind and thoughtful. Indeed, when I was having breakfast it brought many happy thoughts of happy little Easter parties I used to have as a child in the highlands of Ireland, and am sure you must love our dear old flag and when a Britisher is away, mixed up with foreigners, he thinks quite a bit about it. In Western Canada, when the Motherland declared war, we were all in such a way to help. I joined Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on Aug. 12, and Princess Patricia, the daughter of the Duke of Connaught, whom the regiment is called after, made our colors with her own hands. We have nearly all of us fought for our King and Empire. Our colonel, Colonel Fenwick, D. S. O., a kind and gallant soldier, got killed and Major Hamilton Gault was wounded. It was he who paid all expenses. He bought all our clothes, guns and everything, and it must have cost him a few hundred thousand dollars. I will do my best to kill some Germans, that is if they don't kill me. I have got two medals for fighting in South Africa. Now, dear little Olive, I know we shall win, and we will make Germany pay for what they have done to the dear little Belgian children. Our flag is the flag of liberty, and there is more justice under it than under any other flag in the world."
