THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL Que. June 23 - With foreign buyers refusing to pay the prices asked by local exporters for grain, the Montreal market today was slow. There was some demand from exporters in the local market and purchases of local wheat at 12 1/2 cts per bushel over the Winnipeg July option, and a few loads of No. 3 Canadian Western barley at eleven cents per bushel over. A general amount of business was also done in car lots and the tone of the market was firm. No. 2 Canadian Western were quoted at 62 1/2 cts, No. 3 at 57 1/2 cts and No. 1 feed at 55 1/2 cts. Extreme dullness marked the spring and winter wheat four to day but prices for all grades ruled steady.

Prices for all lines of milled wheat were maintained with a fair trade being transacted. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats showed no improvement, but prices were maintained firm. An unsettled feeling developed in the larger market and jobbing prices in some cases were reduced one cent per dozen. This was attributed to the large supplies made. Fresh extras were quoted at 37 to 38 and firsts 33 to 34, per dozen, the receipts were 2,466.

Owing to the warm weather, prevailing and the fact that buyers seemed well supplied with the present, the market for potatoes was quiet and the undertone continued easy with lower prices expected in the near future. Quebec varieties were quoted at \$1.80 per bag.

The feature of the butter trade was the easier feeling that developed and prices were shaded 1/4 cent per pound, which was due to the warm weather. No. 1 standardized offered at 34 1/2 cts per cwt. packages. The tone of the cheese market was easier, purchases of Western No. 1 white and colored were made at 18 1/2 cts per pound and it was reported that as low as 18 1/2 cts to 18 cts per pound were accepted for other lots. Eastern grades were quoted at 18 cents per pound to 18 1/2 cents per pound. The demand for beans was again light and the market was quiet, due to the undertone and car lots of choice white hand picked were quoted at \$2.15 per bushel, and odd lots at \$2.25 to \$2.35 per bushel.

OTTAWA, June 23 - Offers from the west at Toronto today were: extras 30 to 32, firsts 28 to 30, second 24 to 26, Saskatchewans, freight 40 cents Toronto unchanged. Country shippers are paying for firsts better 30, second 23, and making sales firsts and better 34, odd lots. Toronto Dealers are offering for under grade egg extras 33 to 35, firsts 30 to 32, second 25 delivered, cases returned.

Montreal: unchanged, dealers paying delivered extras 32 to 35, firsts 29 to 33, second 25, firsts 35, second 29 to 32, there is a low tendency on the market, car lots selling at extras 34 to 36, firsts 32 to 34, second 27 to 29.

Winnipeg dealers are quoting country shippers extras 31 to 33, firsts 27 to 29, second 24 to 26, firsts 25 to 26, second 18 to 21, delivered cases returned. Prices to retailers extras 35 to 37, firsts 32, second 26.

Saskatchewan - Dealers quoting country shippers extras 25 to 26, firsts 23 to 24, second 19 to 21, firsts to retailers extras 30 to 32, firsts 27 to 29, second 23 to 25.

Edmonton - Egg receipts light, market firm, country dealers are making sales extras 25, firsts 23, second 16, prices to retailers extras 36, firsts 32, second 26.

Calgary - Country dealers making sales extras 25, firsts 21 to 23, second 16 to 18, jobbing extras \$1.80 per case, firsts \$9.60 per case, second \$7.80 per case.

Vancouver - Producers and country shippers selling extras 25, firsts 26, pullet extras 24, firsts 23, pullet extras 22, firsts 21, pullet extras 20.

Canadian Radio Industry Growing

PRODUCTION IN 1925 VALUED AT \$4,548,659, SAYS STATISTICS BUREAU

OTTAWA, June 23. - Production in Canada of radio apparatus, including sets, parts and batteries, reached a total value of \$4,548,659, according to a statement issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

Statistics for 1925 show a substantial growth during that year, and also reveal a tendency toward the production of complete sets rather than in the manufacture of separate parts.

Imports of wireless apparatus and parts into Canada totalled \$2,652,537 during the calendar year, 1925. United States supplied \$3,858,196 worth of these materials. As exports were practically negligible the apparent consumption of radio apparatus in Canada reached a total of \$1,111 receipts, country dealers are paying producers extras 31, firsts 27, second 25, and making sales extras 32, firsts 29, second 26, prices to retailers extras 36, firsts 33, second 30.

Split In British Cabinet Has Been A Serious One

LONDON, June 23. - The Manchester Guardian has now added its voice to that of the Premier, Mr. Baldwin's view that the present was an extremely unsuitable time for adopting drastic action in the matter.

The Premier is believed to be supported by the Earl of Balfour and Marquis of Salisbury, Lord Pringle Seal, and also by law officers who doubt that the action of the Moscow government in connection with the contribution could be construed as "unfriendly."

No division will be taken in the House of Commons Friday, when the debate is staged on the question. Even if a decision were taken it is generally admitted that those who would vote in favor of terminating the trade agreement with the Soviet government would number a mere handful.

SAINT NAZAIRE, France, June 23. - The tablet in the town of Saint Nazaire commemorating the landing of the first Canadian troops in the war was unveiled by Philippe Roy, Canadian Commissioner General in Paris, yesterday afternoon. "Eighteen thousand Canadian soldiers, vanguard of 338,000 men, landed on February 13, 1915, adding to the Canadian corps fought 26 battles between that date and the signing of the Armistice, exactly three years and nine months later."
