HELEN KELLER IN THAW HOME.

ORESSON, Pa., July 10—Miss Helen Keller, who, after being deaf, dumb and blind since her birth, two weeks ago made a speech at Providence, R.I., has arrived here and will pass the summer with her teachers on the estate of Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, mother of Harry K. Thaw. Miss Keller will complete her study of articulation and by fall is expected to be able to talk as clearly as any one. Miss Keller's teachers are Mrs. John Macey, her lifelong companion, and Mrs. John W. White of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. Professor White has spent months

teaching the girl to talk. Miss Keller's vocal organs are perfectly normal, but she never has been able to hear a word nor see. It is difficult for her even to learn the proper lip movements. By slow degrees she got control of the sounds she always has been able to make. At first only Mrs. Macey was able to understand her, but when Miss Keller spoke in Providence most of the audience, members of the American Association to Promote the Teaching of Speech to the Deaf, understood her words. How would you go about it to describe a sound to a person who never had heard one? How would you tell a person to make the sound of the letter A, for instance, when that person had never heard a sound, and had nothing with which to make a comparison? Answer that question, and the difficulties under which Miss Keller's teachers have worked, may be understood.

RICHESON COUNSEL IN COURT FIGHT.

LYNCHBURG, July 10—John J. Lee, who was chief counsel for Clarence E. T. Richeson, the Boston clergyman who was electrocuted for the murder of Avis Linnell, engaged in a fist fight in court here with Duncan Drysdale, another lawyer. The clash was preceded by an exchange of epithets in which the words "crook" and "shyster" occurred. Lee had a tumbler in his hand and made a dash for Drysdale. Getting Drysdale's head under his arm, Lee proceeded to batter it with the tumbler. Drysdale got the worst of the encounter, his face being severely cut. Lee was fined \$25, which he paid.
