—GIVEN TWO MONTHS IN JAIL WITH OPTION TO LEAVE TOWN—

A young woman, named Cameron, was sentenced to two months in the Prince County Jail at the Summerside Police Court on Wednesday morning by Stipendiary Magistrate Wyatt, for stealing a watch, valued at \$10, the property of a daughter of her mistress. In pronouncing sentence His Honor said that he would not issue a commitment until the following day as he wished to give the girl a chance to start a new life and make good at her home in the country. In reviewing the evidence the Magistrate said that it was clear that she had stolen the watch as she considered her mistress owed her \$10. This was a common practice among a certain class of servant girls who becoming restless and wishing to leave without proper notice took this means of getting what they considered their rightful pay and taking something which did not belong to them. Both mistresses and servants are bound by law to keep the contracts made between them and if employer and employee did what was right there would be less of this kind of thing. The Judge hoped that the sentence imposed would be a help to the girl in question and a warning to other girls. His Honor also stated that the petty thieving which has been going on in the town for some time was encouraged by the parties concerned on recovery of their property refraining from prosecuting.

COLLEGE PRESS AGENTS TO MEET

CHAPEL HILL, N. C., April 17.—The American College Publicity Association, formerly the American Association of College News Bureaus, will convene at the University of North Carolina here for its 17th annual meeting April 23.

Listed among speakers are Albert N. Ward, president of Western Maryland College; Frank P. Graham, president of the University of North Carolina; Joseph Daniels, publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer and Secretary of the Navy under President Wilson; Coach Wallace Wade of Duke University, former coach at the University of Alabama, and R. A. Fetzer, director of athletics of the University of North Carolina. Approximately 100 delegates are expected.

Highlights of the convention will be the annual banquet and dance on Friday night, April 24.

Association officers are Earl Reed Silvers, Rutgers University, president; Kenneth O. Hesselwood, Hamline University, vice-president; Don M. Cresswell, Pennsylvania State College, secretary-treasurer, and Robert W. Madry, University of North Carolina, convention secretary.

OLD CHICAGO TAVERN LANDMARK TO BE RAZED

CHICAGO, April 17.—One of Chicago's oldest landmarks—the Washington home, which was first a tavern and then an asylum for inebriates and drug addicts—is to be razed.

The five-story brick building that houses within its silent walls memories of Civil War days, will be swept aside before the advance of industry.

History of the home began sometime before 1863 when it was opened as the Bull's head tavern and became the hostelry most patronized by cattle and sheep drovers.

Changes following the war sounded the death knell for taverns and the home became a refuge for persons fighting the results of excessive libation.

The home long was regarded as one of the greatest reformatories for inebriates in the country and city courts sent alcoholics there for treatment.

PROFESSOR INVENTS RUBBER PRESERVER

DELAWARE, O., April 17.—To Professor G. R. Lohr, of the Ohio Wesleyan University chemistry department, goes the credit for inventing a non-staining age resister for use in preserving light colored rubber goods without discoloring. The process has been patented by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, of Akron, O.

The use of Professor Yorhe's compounds will make it possible to give longer life to white rubber flooring, water bottles, garden hose and golf balls without discoloring them in any way. These compounds are mixed with the rubber in the liquid state.

LOW ASKING PRICES REPORTED FOR EWE LAMBS

OMAHA, Neb., April 17.—Reports of low asking prices for old ewes and new crop lambs and prospects for free shipment of ewe lambs held over from last fall during the next few months were brought to the Omaha market from Utah sheepmen. The actual sale of 5,000 head of Utah lambs for delivery at the Missouri river next September and October at five cents a pound was announced recently they said. Oregon growers are said to be offering their lambs as low as four cents with very few takers. Old ewes in both Oregon and Utah have been difficult to move at \$4.50 and 2-year-olds at \$8.50 per head with lamb at side, it is said.

FOOTBALL BOOSTS PATIENTS FOR OREGON PHYSICIANS

SALEM, Ore., April 17.—Football provides the doctors with something more than thrills.

In a survey of Oregon high school football teams, it was learned that 13 per cent of the students participating in the sport received injuries during the 1930 season. Physicians received \$1,697 for medical treatment. Others required no care.

It was found that 1,443 players were listed in 28 schools. Of these, 648 played on first team squads, 795 were subs.

CAPITAL'S BEST GARDENER RETIRES AFTER 45 YEARS

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The best gardener in Washington was retired the first week of April, after 45 years in government service.

Charles Henlock, chief horticulturist since May 1, 1886, has had charge of all flowers and shrubs in the District of Columbia for 45 years.

His successor, David E. Saunders, has served more than half a dozen Presidents. Saunders comes from a family of famous horticulturists.

LUMBER MAGNATE TO OWN LUXURIOUS PLANE

STRAFORD, Conn., April 17. (U. P.)—Friends of E. W. Backus, lumber magnate of the Pacific Northwest, soon will be able to play backgammon, chess or cards as they speed through the clouds in the most luxurious airplane yet built in this country.

A huge amphibion, built for Backus here, will contain, among other luxuries a folding back-gammon board with built-in pockets for dice,

poker chips, chess men and cards.

The plane seats 11 and has sleeping accommodations for six. A couch on the port side of the cabin can seat four persons and be converted into a bed. In drawers beneath are stores, sheets, pillow cases and blankets, all monogrammed with the owner's initials.

SPOTTED FEVER REPORTED IN FEW NEW STATES

WASHINGTON, April 15 (U. P.)—The dreaded spotted fever has appeared in the eastern and southeastern states, according to the Public Health Service. Spotted fever was hitherto thought to exist only in the western states particularly in the Rocky Mountain area.

Spotted fever is a disease spread by the bite of lice and is considered quite severe. Death runs from 60 to 90 percent with the disease in the Rocky Mountain area. The disease, however, Public Health Service officials say has not spread far in the east and southeast.

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
