N. Y. Stock Prices Stumbled Last Week After Long Climb

NEW YORK, July 20—(AP)—The stock market stumbled last week after one of the most substantial two-month recoveries in a long time. Bonds trailed with shares to a lesser degree.

Monday was the best day for the stock division with activity the most pronounced of the week. Buying and short covering were evident mainly in rising inflationary psychology based on the wage-price spiral. From then until Friday the course was downward as speculative contingents cashed in on the idea that the exceptionally lengthy upswing called for a sizable technical correction.

On the week the Associated Press 60-stock composite showed a net decline of .1 of a point at 67.2, first drop since the sharply slumping period concluded May 17. The comeback started from that date and, with scattered interruptions, the over-all index climbed 9.3 points up to last Monday, in terms of quoted values, about \$9,000,000.

Volume for the week of 5,938,973 shares compared with 6,096,780 the week before which was a top since the six-day period of May 24. On Thursday the 1,000,000-share market was bettered for the full 12th straight session, a record since last December.

Rails pushed up Monday on hopes of passenger and freight rate boosts, with steels, motors, and specialty industrials following. Turnover was 1,660,000 shares, largest since May 19. Selling in the final hour cut gains. It was the broadest market since Oct. 9 with 1,077 issues appearing.

One of the reasons for the market bulge of the last several weeks was seen in the disclosure that the stock exchange short interest as of July 15 was reduced to 1,418,302 shares from 1,539,538 on June 17, largest decrease since June, 1946.

Field Day At New London

The second in the series of three Field Days sponsored by the Division of Illustration Stations in cooperation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture was held at the illustration station owned and operated by William E. Johnstone, New London, Wednesday afternoon, July 16th.

Over 250 assembled and were afforded an opportunity to observe and study the efficient manner in which this station operator was making use of the land. By the use of commercial fertilizers and barnyard manure, the station operator has been in a position to provide sufficient forage for some 31 head of cattle.

The hilly slopes on this farm have been fenced off and placed under permanent pasture, and to prevent soil erosion and wash, a heavy sod is being established by the use of manurial applications. By adopting the practice of contour ploughing, sheet erosion has been practically controlled. The Provincial Department of Agriculture, Provincial Red Cross commissioner, entertained the ladies in the large illustration tent whilst farmers toured the station fields. Peace time activities of the Canadian Red Cross were reviewed the speaker enumerating many outstanding achievements of the past and the various assistant measures directed to those under-privileged at the present time.

Quality Production Stressed

During the tour of the farm fields the Supervisor reviewed and discussed the various projects now active at this station. Mr. H. J. MacDonald, Dairy Superintendent, Provincial Department of Agriculture, stressed the importance of producing high quality dairy products. It was pointed out that Nova Scotia was one of our best markets, but that competition from other provinces was keen. A well equipped laboratory in Charlottetown is now at the disposal of farmers for testing and grading samples of butter from each churning at respective dairies. Marketing difficulties and quality of product, the speaker stressed, are major factors confronting the industry.

Iced water tanks are a valuable asset to dairymen and the cooling of milk is very essential if a high quality product is to be marketed, but the speaker added further that cooling is not a substitute for sanitation. Due to deterioration in the quality of cream when held over at the farm for several days, the speaker indicated that no first grade butter was manufactured from a one week delivery of cream to respective creameries. Farmers were urged to adopt careful sanitary precautions in view of the fact butter fat was one product that absorbs all kinds of odours.

U. S. Steel Price Advance Uncertain

CLEVELAND, July 20—(AP)—indications are that no industry-wide steel price increase will be effected prior to the end of July. Steel magazine reported today.

The extent to which steel prices will be increased still was uncertain last week, said the magazine, adding: "Comment in some market circles was that the over-all 'raise would average out at about \$5 per ton, but a few market authorities advanced the idea the increase may come out closer to \$3 per ton."

National steelmaking operations, practically recovered from effects of the coal-mining suspension, increased 6.1-2 points last week to 92.5 per cent of rated capacity.

CROP REPORT

WINNIPEG, Man., July 19—The prairies have experienced another week of extremely hot weather with scattered showers and hailstorms. Crops have stood up well in Manitoba, Alberta and southeastern Saskatchewan. In northern and west-central Saskatchewan, there has been little rainfall and the crop has deteriorated during the past week, wheat varies from 50 per cent to 100 per cent headed out and is up to 25 inches in height in the moisture areas, coarse grains are doing well and in southeast Saskatchewan it is expected that the fall rye harvest will start this weekend. Hay-making is under way in Alberta and prospects are for a good crop. Much needed rains were received in the Peace River and conditions there are improved greatly, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

POTATO INSPECTION

Potato growers in this Province who have not yet made application for potato inspection are urgently requested to immediately send their applications in to the P. E. I. Department of Agriculture. In making application the following information is required:

- (1) Number of acres of potatoes grown.
- (2) Variety.
- (3) Number of bushels purchased for this year's seeding.
- (4) Grade of seed purchased (Foundation, Foundation A, or Certified).
- (5) From whom purchased and the address.
- (6) Number of Certification tag.
- (7) State clearly the name of the grower, the post office address and the school district.

According to the Act passed at the recent session of the Legislature potato crops grown during the present year shall be subject to inspection. In order that this inspection may be efficiently carried out effect a complete list of growers in this Province must be compiled and a field staff organized to take care of inspection work in every school district in the Province. It will be to the distinct advantage of all concerned if plans for listing growers are completed at the earliest possible moment. Potato growers are required to list their acreages as suggested, and it is to their distinct advantage that this matter be attended to immediately.
