Miss Miriam Toombs, who served so faithfully as organist since the Institute was organized, tendered her resignation as she intends to leave for the west in the near future. A farewell address was read to her and she was presented with a parking gift. The stock committee goes about doing their good work bringing comfort and cheer to those who are ill. Mrs. (Dr.) Martin and Miss Jeanette MacDonald were the hostesses of the evening and served delicious collation. The meeting was closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

MARKET REVIEW TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 28—Today's market sales fell below half a million. About the only outstanding advance was in Merland Oil which moved up 40 cents to \$1.40 on news of the well blowing in with a heavy gas flow. Sterling Pacific moved up slightly in sympathy. The rest of the oils were unchanged except perhaps Mayland which started to sell off near the close to \$2.75 on the strength of report from Calgary that the cleaning out of the well for a test showed little change in the previous gas flow. Following the close of Standard the stock sold off sharply on the Western Exchanges.

Weakness in Noranda and Nickel became more pronounced Monday afternoon following weakness in Anaconda and Kennecott. While the soft copper prices are said to have held at 18 cents it was unofficially reported as being offered at under 18 cents, while in Toronto, it was 17 1/2. This is the first break in Copper below 18 cents since February 6, when it moved up from 17 1/2 and kept going until 24 was reached. Last report on Copper stock, in October said stock on hand was reduced and that producers might curtail output. Railway expansion program in United States was well received as promising to keep copper market healthy. But on other bears have been predicting a price tumble.

BUILDING DEMOLISHED—During the past summer and fall, work has been conducted by the Provincial Department of Public Works, using labor from Falconwood Hospital, to demolish the building beside old Government House, formerly used as an Agricultural Technical School, and previous to that time as a soldiers' convalescent home. As material was necessary for repairs to Falconwood Hospital a number of inmates were put to work under supervision and removed portions of the interior of the building. Hardwood flooring was used for the corridors of the hospital, and various pieces of material were removed by parties contracting with the Department of Public Works. It has been proposed building a cottage at Falconwood with part of the remaining material. At the present time a section of the roof is being removed, and officials intend to fill in the cellar with part of the excavated material from the site of the old K. of C. Home. Constructed hurriedly during the Great War as a convalescent home, the building was never meant to withstand the attacks of time or frost. As a consequence sagging floors, bulging partitions, and an unstable foundation have made it imperative that the building, which no longer can be put to any public use, be removed, leaving the old Government House in its former state, possibly to be renovated or restored.
