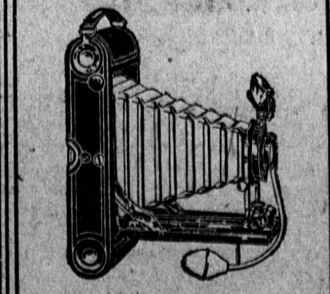
FRUIT TREES IN BLOOM.—During the past week the leaves have been coming out very rapidly on the fruit trees. The blossoms will soon be showing. In some sections of the Province, there is a considerable presence of bud moth, and the spraying for this troublesome insect should be done before the blossoms come out. The best spray for this purpose is the lime sulphur wash, summer strength, poisoned with three lbs. of arsenate of lead to 40 gals. of the lime sulphur. As the Department of Agriculture intends to market apples this autumn, it would be well for everyone to spray. This spraying also will help to control the spot which was so troublesome last year.

TANGIBLE HONOUR.—The Guardian learns that the girl students of P. W. College, who are boarders at Notre Dame Convent, are returning to their homes, the happy winners of \$15.00 each; the "Strathcona Prize," awarded to all who pass with highest rank the physical examination requirements. This is a distinction that reflects creditably on the Convent, and tells of the wise and practical attention bestowed by the good Sisters on their young charges. The Prince of Wales girls at the Convent are under the supervision of one of the foremost teachers of the Order; a Prince Edward Island lady of distinctly brilliant mind, whose magnetic personality and warm Irish heart hold the affection and trust of those under her motherly care.

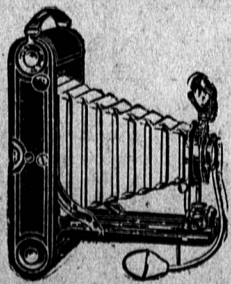
