B., Aug. 4.—New Brunswick potato growers have no cause at present to worry greatly over the prospect of this season's crop suffering from the attack of rust, a fungus disease, which if unchecked causes the plants to wilt. Only in a few isolated cases has the disease become prevalent, according to C. H. Godwin, who has investigated it in connection with his activities at the Dominion Plant Pathological Laboratory in this city. On the whole the present prospects are for a large clean crop of tubers almost everywhere.

Government early in its history, Canada extended to France certain definite preferential tariff rates on many commodities. In return France conceded most favored nation treatment on many Canadian products; that is tariff rates equal to the best she gave any country on these commodities. But after the treaty was negotiated, France raised these most favored nation rates sky high. For instance the duty on wheat was raised to 96 cents a bushel. The result was that French goods continued to come into Canada under preferential rates, competing with several Canadian industries, while Canada's wheat was virtually barred from the French market.

A difficult problem is presented, many believe in the trade arrangement with Japan, long an exporter of silk, a commodity on which the Dunning Budget lowered the duties. Still farther, Japan is now a cotton exporter as well. Japanese cotton goods are made for the most part, it is claimed, by girls whose usual wage is said to be \$1 a month. Let alone competing with Canadian manufacturers the Japanese spinners can even meet the competition of British mills right in England's midlands, the home of the British cotton industry.

At the other end of the picture stands the western wheat grower with the enormous carry over of wheat and the present crop yet to come. Canada must seek wheat sales in the Orient. How to balance these two considerations, the welfare of cotton and silk spinners and the demand of the wheat grower for new markets, is a delicate problem for any Government to handle, and somewhere between the two are the people of Vancouver and the other Pacific ports. They want increased trade with the Orient. Trade of any kind, imports and exports for both keep shippers busy.
