THE TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, March 11.—Moderate to fresh northwesterly winds, fast and no decided change in temperature. THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully mild and springlike; continuing clear and mild at night. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 32 degrees above zero and the lowest was 26 above. The lowest the previous night was 24 above. At nine a. m. yesterday it was 28 above and at nine p. m. 26 above. The tide will be high this morning at 10.25 and tomorrow at 11.04; it rises tonight at 10.13 and tomorrow at 11.10. The sun sets this evening at 6 and tomorrow at 6.02; it rises tomorrow morning at 6.18 and Friday at 6.16. The moon rises this afternoon at 5.49. The first quarter of the moon was on Thursday, March 5th at 1.03 a. m. There will be a full moon on Thursday, March 12th at 12.18 a. m. The length of today will be eleven hours and forty-one minutes.
