**SALISBURY STORIES.**

**Strange Mistakes Made by the Late Premier of Great Britain.**

The London Daily Graphic, in its issue of August 25, has the following in its long biographical sketch of the late Lord Salisbury: "Closely connected with his retiring disposition was a curious mental aloofness—to borrow Mr. T. P. O'Connor's apt phrase—which often caused Lord Salisbury to make remarkable mistakes of identity. The Manchester Guardian is responsible for the story that Lord Salisbury, the Bishop of London, and many others, happened to be in a room with the King. The King told the Bishop—who, by the way, had been one of Lord Salisbury's own appointments—that Lord Salisbury had asked in reference to him, 'Who is that young-looking cleric?' And then, to save embarrassment of the Bishop, His Majesty added, pleasantly: 'But you need not mind that. I just showed him the latest photograph of myself, and after looking at it some moments in silence, he said, sympathetically, 'Poor old Butler!'"

Another story of the same character refers to an incident at a garden party at Hatfield the summer before last, while the South African War was still in progress. A certain Baronet, who had recently returned from a visit to South Africa, was among the guests. In the course of the afternoon Lord Salisbury took him by the arm, saying, "I want a quiet word with you," and proceeded to inquire about his views on the military situation. The Baronet, astonished and delighted by this mark of honor, freely offered long and detailed criticisms on the war and everything connected with it, to all of which Lord Salisbury listened with profound attention. Later his nephew asked: "What did you find to talk about so long a time with Sir So-and-So?" "I don't know what you mean," was the reply. "I never spoke to him in my life. I have just been having a long and important talk with Lord Roberts—and I certainly found him thoroughly outspoken."

**Money Lender Lewis' Estate.**

The estate of Mr. Samuel Lewis, the famous London money-lender, who lived at Grosvenor square and Cork street, Burlington Gardens, and died on Jan. 18, 1901, was valued, when probate of his will was granted on Jan. 21, 1901, at £1,000,000, so far as then could be ascertained. The estate has since been re-valued at £2,572,658 17s., and it seems probable, therefore, that the two-thirds of his residuary estate which he bequeathed in reversion for charitable and other public uses will amount to about £1,500,000. It was also stated that shortly before his death Mr. Lewis had put the amount of his fortune at two and a half millions, a figure now proved to be remarkably correct. The immediate bequests to charities made in the will amounted to £5,000 and his relatives, solicitor, clerks and servants all received legacies of sums ranging from £15,000 to £100. The two-thirds of the residuary estate are to be divided between 40 institutions on Mrs. Lewis' death. Among the chief of these bequests are £400,000 for establishing dwellings for the poor, £250,000 for the Prince of Wales Hospital Fund, £100,000 for the relief of the Jewish poor, and the following amounts to various hospitals: London £30,000, Maidenhead £10,000, Evelina £5,000, Paddington-green £5,000, and £10,000 each to Guy's, Charing Cross, St. George's, St. Bartholomew's, St. Thomas' and University College. Another thoughtful bequest was that of £250 to the poor boxes at all the London Police Courts.
