Recovery Trend Wipes Out Early Losses

NEW YORK, Feb. 4 —(AP)—The stock market put on a right-about-face today and leading issues climbed back fractions to more than 2 points into new low ground since 1935 at the opening, but offerings quickly dried up and a plodding recovery got under way which continued to the close. Transfers totaled 800,290 shares compared with 1,088,350 Thursday. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .9 of a point at 42.2.

American Telephone flopped more than 3 points at the start, but eventually retrieved all of this and emerged with a net advance of 1.4 points to 131.7-8. Fractional gains and declines were evenly divided among Canadian stocks. Un were Distillers-Scouring, 2.00; westerns, International Nickel and McIntyre. Brazilian, Marconi, Massey Harris and Ford showed losses of 7.8 of a point and less.

Bulls tended to ignore official figures on last week's freight loading revealing a contra-seasonal decline.

Motors were unaffected by announcement Packard had cut prices of its cars. Steels held the upper despite indications of a slight dip in next week's mill operations. They yielded part of their gains at the finish.

THEATRICAL SPOTLIGHT TURNS WEST

OTTAWA, Feb. 3 — Canada's theatrical spotlight will be focused on Western Canada's amateur theatres next month as regional trials of the Dominion Drama Festival are held to determine the plays and actors who will compete in the Winnipeg finals in May for the famed Bessborough Trophy and the other awards.

Finalists have been determined already in the Maritimes and Prince Edward Island and in the Maritimes and Prince Edward Island joint regional festival and selected "The Shadow in the Glen" by John M. Singe played by the Theatre Guild of Saint John, as the one to represent that region in the finals.

Last Saturday night in Quebec City the dramatic section of the Quebec National Conservatory of Music won first honors in the Quebec East regional festival with presentation of "Dejeuner Delamoureux" by Andre Birabeau.

The Bessborough Trophy is awarded annually to the best-produced play at the finals and competing productions may be either in French or English.

Another award is given the next best play in French and another for the next best English production.

From Wednesday to Saturday this week, Mr. Morley will judge the Manitoba Regional Festival in Winnipeg. In Saskatchewan the regional festival will be held Alberta's will take place in Calgary from Feb. 19 to 19 and British Columbia's in Victoria Feb. 23 to 26.

Then the regional adjudicator will return east to Ottawa where the Ontario East, French section, plays will be produced March 3 and 4 or March 4 and 5.

The Quebec west festival is planned to take place in Quebec on Feb. 12 and 13 and the Ontario west festival and in Toronto from March 28 to April 2. The Ontario Ontario festival will be held.

The finalists in the various regions will then go to Winnipeg to compete for the highest award in Canada's amateur theatre, last year, Toronto Masqueurs, presented original comedy by John Coulter, "The House in The Quiet Glen" won the Bessborough Trophy in the finals at Ottawa.
