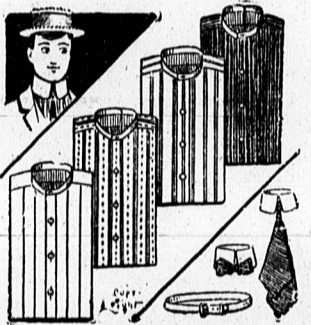

The remains will be forwarded to the home of Colonel Palmer, brother of the deceased, from which place the interment will take place on tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock to the Brackley Point Cemetery. The remains have been in a receiving vault in Boston since Mr. Perry's death awaiting the opening of navigation between this province and the mainland.

A despatch from Ottawa says: The census and statistic department have issued a bulletin on the condition of live stock in Canada as it emerged from the winter months. Generally speaking the reports from every province are good. Prince Edward Island with abundance of fodder, live stock in the island have wintered well, and cattle and horses are reported to be in excellent condition. Horses are scarce, and high in value. Potatoes are somewhat scarce. Nova Scotia—The winter has been long, with steady and intense cold. Live stock have wintered well and are reported as being in excellent condition. Fodder has been abundant owing to the bountiful hay and root crops of last year. Some correspondents report that in spite of the long cold winter from 20 to 25 per cent of the supply of hay still remains in hand. Horses are scarce and high in price. New Brunswick—The good crops of hay, clover and oats last year gave an abundance of winter feed, and in general all classes of live stock have come through a severe winter in excellent condition. Quebec—Throughout the province the condition of live stock is reported to be excellent. Food supplies proved abundant, tho in many districts the length and severity of the winter caused a longer consumption than usual. Where employed in connection with lumber camps horses have fallen off in condition and some losses have been caused by distemper.

OTTOMAN EMPIRE RECOGNIZES HER

LONDON, May 4.—The marriage of Miss Ola Humphrey to Prince Ibrahim Hassan, a relative of the Khedive, has raised many questions as to whether such a ceremony between a Mohammedan and a Christian celebrated in an English registry office would be considered legal in the Ottoman Empire.

A correspondent visited the Turkish Embassy in Portland place, where one of the secretaries said:—"The marriage will be held as legal both in Turkey and Egypt. There is no question as to that. The only thing is that the wife of Prince Hassan becomes a Turkish subject. Should the question of divorce arise, the matter would be laid before the Mohammedan religious authorities, who would have the power to dissolve the marriage if they saw fit. Such divorce would be held good in all Mohammedan countries, but whether, in view of the civil marriage taking place in England, an English divorce would also be necessary to make it effective in European countries I cannot say.

"As to the position of Prince Hassan's wife, she becomes a Princess by courtesy, just as Prince Hassan, by virtue of being a member of the Khedival family, is a Prince by court-

esy. Should there be a divorce his wife would no longer be entitled to call herself princess.

"Whether she will be recognized in Turkish and Egyptian society depends entirely upon the attitude of Prince Hassan's family. It is a personal matter which will be decided by the head of the family.

"As to the Princess going into seclusion upon her arrival in Mohammedan countries, that depends entirely upon the wife's religion. If she remains a Christian she will find no difference in her life, being free to move about in society as she does in European countries. If she changes her religion and becomes a Mohammedan then, of course she will be obliged to wear the veil and conform to the customs to Mohammedan wives."

When told of the speculation that was rife as a result of the marriage, the secretary said: "People have very vivid imaginations when the East and its customs are mentioned. There are a number of cases of Mohammedans marrying Christian women, the latter having retained their religion, and their lives are as happy and as uneventful as those in Occidental countries."

ALMOST A HORROR SCARED BY A FIRE.

NEW YORK, May 5.—Six hundred and fifty girls, employed in a shirt-waist factory, rushed screaming for

the stairs from the third and fourth floors at the sight of a burning awning fire below them. The congestion between the floors became terrific, and a hand rail on the stairway snapped and thirteen girls fell in a shrieking heap in the hallway between.

Fourteen were injured.
