Canadian Dollar At Par In N.Y.

Governmental And Private Organizations Enjoy Advantage Of Par Value

\$80,000 FIRE AT SYDNEY

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—For the first time since September 1931 the Canadian dollar sold at par in New York Monday.

The movement of Canadian exchange was sympathetic to the recession of United States currency against the Pound sterling which simultaneously rose against the French franc. Experts in New York were confident the rise of the Canadian dollar was to be accounted for largely by the decline in United States currency, but admitted prospects of gold buying in Canada might have something to do with it.

URGES ARMS Troops Ordered Out Against U.S. CONFERENCE RECONVENE Farm Strikers

Premier Mussolini Confers With Goering With View of Ending Arms Stalemate.

(By Andrie Berding, Associated Press Foreign Staff)

ROME, Nov. 6.—The possibility that Premier Mussolini will call a meeting of four European powers and the United States to consider the disarmament stalemate was seen by well informed circles here today after Il Duce and Hermann Wilhelm Goering, German minister without portfolio, had an hour conference.

General Goering, who arrived with a retinue by aeroplane this afternoon, and the Premier talked in the latter's Venezia Palace office about disarmament, recovery in the Danubian area, and Austria, reliable quarters said.

Arms Parley

The conversation on disarmament was said to have revolved around the method to be pursued to reopen the arms parley, broken off shortly after Germany withdrew from Geneva.

NATIONAL II Duce Assumes Military Offices

Relieves Italo Balbo Of Air Marshallship In Taking Over New Cabinet Posts.

ROME, Nov. 6.—(A.P.)—Premier Mussolini became the head of all armed forces in Italy in name as well as fact today when King Victor Emmanuel gave him the navy and air portfolios in addition to the army ministry which Il Duce already had.

The immediate result of the Cabinet changes, which involved the transfer of Air Marshal Italo Balbo to the Governorship of Libya, is expected to be the enactment of measures to intensify and widen the Fascist control of all defence units.
