The Young Men's Man

A PROVINCIALIST IS INDUCTED

The following is taken from a British Weekly and will be of much interest in this Province.

"The service at Pinray Church on Sunday morning was conducted by Rev. Professor Paterson, Edinburgh, who introduced to the congregation Rev. James A. Crawford, whose induction to the charge took place on Thursday, Professor Paterson, after preaching an eloquent sermon on the respective duties of congregation and minister, said: "The special occasion of my appearance here today is to introduce Mr. Crawford, who has already been elected and inducted as minister of this parish and congregation. It has been a pleasure to me to come and introduce him formally to his flock. There is the less need that I should say much upon this occasion, because Mr. Crawford's election has taken place under conditions which are not too common, I mean, that you have called him, not upon the strength—as often happens—of a single appearance in this pulpit, but you have called him upon the ground that you had an opportunity of proving his message and his efficacy in pastoral work, and of forming a judgment upon the character of the man. In this respect, when you have called him with due and sustained approbation, you are both to be congratulated as fortunate. My special knowledge of Mr. Crawford is due to the circumstance that he returned from Canada, bringing with him the records of an honourable ministry that had been spent in the Dominion; that he had resumed his studies in the Divinity Hall of the University of Edinburgh, and that during the last two years he has been well known, both to myself and to my colleagues as an extremely diligent and capable student of divinity; while by the kindness of his character and the modesty of his demeanour, he has warmly endeared himself to his fellow-students in the Divinity Hall. I do not need to refer to the fact that he is a Canadian. The time is past when we thought of Colonials as being abler than fellow-countrymen. We now think of them as citizens with ourselves of the British Empire, only that they have a somewhat richer experience and a somewhat wider outlook than we who have passed our lives at home." Professor Paterson expressed his great sympathy with Mr. Catto and with his family in the weariness and weakness of his old age, "remembering, as I well do, when I came to the Divinity Hall from my Perthshire parish, there was no face that smiled a brighter welcome, and there was no hand that gave me a heartier clasp, than the face and hand of him you have learned so deeply to respect." (Rev. James A. Crawford is a native of Cardigan, P. E. I., and has many relatives and friends in this Province.)

NEW STEAMER REPORTED LOST

LIVERPOOL, N. S., March 15.—Messrs. A. W. Hendry & Son, of this town, have just received word of the loss of the comparatively new tern schooner Rossignol, Capt. Mathews, on a voyage from Colon, on the north side of the Panama Isthmus, for New York. No further particulars of the disaster were given than that the crew had landed at Colon. The Rossignol was a vessel of 193 tons, and was launched here in January, 1908. She was insured.

REPORT OF TRANSCONTINENTAL.

OTTAWA, March 16.—The report of the Transcontinental Commission covering the construction of the Road for the last nine months of 1908 has been presented to Parliament. During that period of expenditure was \$18,866,212, making a total of \$45,924,159. At the end of the year the total number of miles of grading completed was 668, and 309 miles of track were laid. The whole line from Moncton to Winnipeg is now under contract, and satisfactory progress is being made in all the contracts.
