THE LAKE HURON.

The S. S. Lake Huron sailed yesterday afternoon from this port for Liverpool this being the first outward trip of the direct service this season. Though the steamer was but 42 hours in port, and part of that time was occupied in discharging freight, she was loaded to her full capacity before sailing. Her cargo valued at \$75,000 was made up of cattle, sheep, poultry, eggs, canned goods and various farm products elsewhere enumerated.

The promptness with which this large steamship was fully loaded and despatched tells its own story of how the direct service is seized upon and appreciated by our farmers and shippers. The accommodation for live stock on the Lake Huron is very favorably spoken of by those most interested, and there is little doubt that when her next trip is made, about the first of December she will again have a full deck load, as well as an entire cargo up to her carrying capacity.

A Montreal despatch tells that Col. Yule, who succeeded General Symons in command after the battle of Glencoe is a Canadian by birth and son of the late John Yule of Chambly, Quebec, who who was formerly a seigneur there.

It is painful news that the brave General Symons is dead, and it must add to the universal sorrow to learn that he died a prisoner in the hands of the enemy. The total British loss in killed, wounded, missing and prisoners as officially reported to the War Office down to the 25th was 679, made up as follows: Officers killed, 18; wounded 55; men killed 76; men wounded 435; missing 13; prisoners with the Boers 82. The number of prisoners is probably much greater than here stated.

THE SONS of England Record says: A calamity of such terrible magnitude has recently overtaken one of the most highly esteemed of our Nova Scotian brethren that we cannot find words in which to adequately express the depth of our sympathy with our sorely stricken brother. On Labor Day five daughters and the son and daughters-in-law of Bro. Davidson, Chaplain of Chebucto Lodge, Halifax, N. S., went for a sail accompanied by four friends. The boat was swamped, and a few hours later the sea gave back to Bro. Davidson the dead bodies of five of his family. Two of the friends also perished, the survivors being two daughters of Bro. Davidson, and two naval officers who were of the party, and by whose heroism alone the surviving Misses Davidson were saved. The tragedy cast a gloom over the whole community, and the funeral of the victims witnessed a demonstration of sympathy never paralleled in a Canadian city. Well we know that no words of ours can assuage the bitter grief with which the hearts of the bereaved parents are torn, but it nevertheless may be a source of some little comfort to Bro. Davidson in the days to come to know that in the dark hours of his affliction he had the deep and earnest sympathy of his brethren throughout the country. [Mr. Davidson resided for a number of years in Charlottetown, P. E. Island, and was well known there to its many citizens.]

The Lake Huron sailed at 2.30 yesterday afternoon after being in port 42 hours, during part of which she was discharging her inward cargo. The shippers of live stock are well pleased with the accommodation furnished by the steamer and a full deck load was sent. Her outward cargo is valued at \$75,000 and consisted of the following: 2055 boxes cheese, 947 cases canned mut on and beef, 60 cases canned cranberries, 208 bales of hay, 775 packages butter, 1745 cases of eggs, 8 bb's oysters, 24 boxes poultry, 9 cases dry fish, 91 head of cattle, 1591 head of sheep, 23 standard deal, 14 cases lobsters, 837 bgs oats, 42 bgs potatoes, shipped by J. H. Myrick & Co. Horace Haszard, Dillon & Spillet, L.P. Taunton, Auld Bros. C. R. Dickey, A.A. McDonald, Bros. J. A. Farquharson & Co. Carvill Bros. H. W. Longworth, E. Wheatley, J. Wheatley, W. W. Clarke, N. Rattebury. The result of the shipment of dressed poultry by the department of agriculture will be watched with interest. Mr. C. R. Dickey of Muddy Creek has sent a consignment of net berries as an experiment and it is hoped that he will be successful. The next direct steamer will be due here December 1st.
