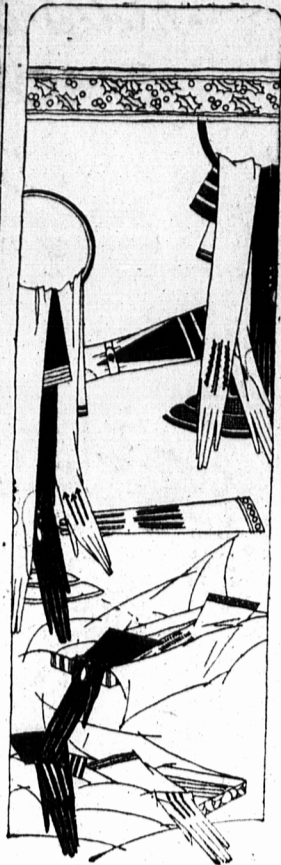

GENERAL ELECTION IN ENGLAND PROBABLY FEBRUARY

LONDON, Dec. 10.—A general election in England may be expected simultaneously with the creation of the Irish parliament in consequence of the alteration of the constitution of the Imperial House of Commons through the removal of the Irish members at Westminster, according to the parliamentary correspondent of the London Times, in event of Ulster's acquiescence in the allotment there will be a reduction in the number of the members of the House of Commons of 105 otherwise 72.

Parliament after acting next week on the Irish agreement, the correspondent adds, will adjourn until the New Year. The drafting of the Irish Bill will be begun immediately and be ready for presentation in parliament in January. It should be possible to carry it, as it would be a virtually non-contentious measure, through all stages of both Houses by the end of January. The election will possibly take place in February.
