THE COOK'S CORNER

LEMON FLUFF.

Place in the top of a double boiler four tablespoons cornstarch, few grains salt, one cupful fine granulated sugar, and mix with one-third cupful cold milk. Then add slowly one and two-thirds cupful more milk. Place over heat and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add two beaten eggs-yolk, first pouring a little of the hot mixture over the yolk, and then returning all to the double boiler. Cook two minutes, remove from heat and add grated rind of two lemons and three-fourths cupful lemon juice. Stir in the stiffly beaten whites of the two eggs, place in sherberts and serve cold with a topping of sweetened whipped cream.

LEMON CREAM PUDDING.

Two egg yolks, 1-2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt. Mix to a smooth paste with a little water. Add 2 cups of hot milk and cook until it thickens. Take off the fire, add juice and grated rind of 1 lemon. When pudding is cold put the stiffly beaten whites of eggs on the top.
