Cowley takes Big lead in Point-getting

MONTREAL, Jan. 27—(CP)—Four assists in one game when Boston routed Americans Sunday night—made up the point-getting of Bill Cowley for the week, but it was enough to widen his margin atop the National Hockey League scoring race.

Those four assists ran the total of the Boston center to 37 points on nine goals and 28 assists, for a five-point margin over Toronto's Syl Apps, who has 15 goals and 17 assists.

Phil Watson of Rangers remained in third place four points behind Apps, while two other Rangers, Bryan Hexall and Neil Colville were tied for fourth spot with 26 points each.

Sweeney Schriner of Toronto, Drillon for fifth position with 25 points, led the goal-getters with 16, while Cowley's 28 assists gave him the leadership in that department. Apps and Drillon were right behind Schriner in goals with 15 each, but Cowley had a clear margin of 10 points over Watson, his nearest rival in the scoring column.

Jimmy Orlando of Detroit remained the league's official badman with 54 minutes in major and five-point penalty. Pat Egan of Americans had 25 minutes and one match penalty, while Canadiens' Red Goupille had 32 minutes and two 10-minute misconducts.

H. R. Beven and R. B. Nicholson staged another nip and tuck battle with the former finally winning out 6-5. After the playing of first four ends the count was deadlocked at 3-3; Beven went ahead as he scored singles on the next two ends only to have Nicholson come right back with a two on the seventh to again square the match, leaving the issue right up to the final end with Beven getting the deciding point after each rink had held the advantage several times during the final end of the match.

In the other matches H. C. Bohaker won 7-4 from Harper, McNeill; L. S. Stephenson beat J. H. Curry 11-3 while Charles MacKinnon skipped his rink to an 11-4 win over W. Beer.

As the teams dwindle in numbers the competition promises to be exceptionally keen and many exciting battles are being looked forward to. This competition is open to first and second year curlers and is one of the annual competitions of the Club.

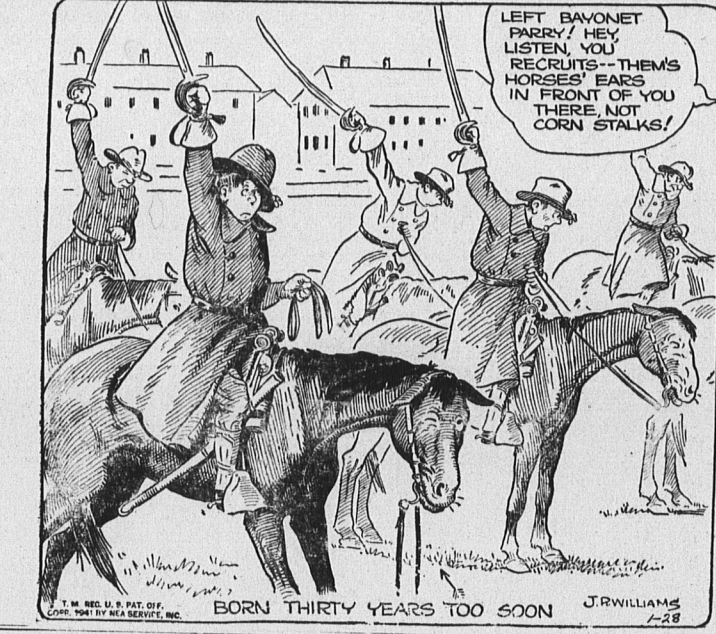

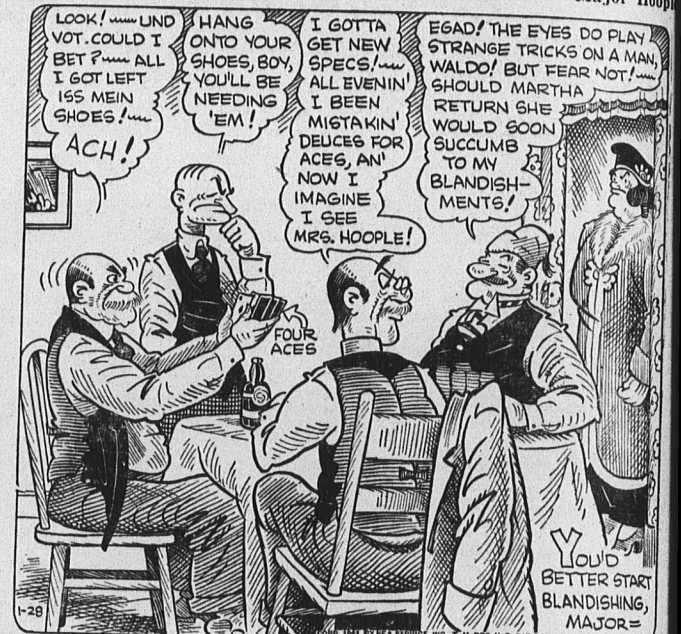

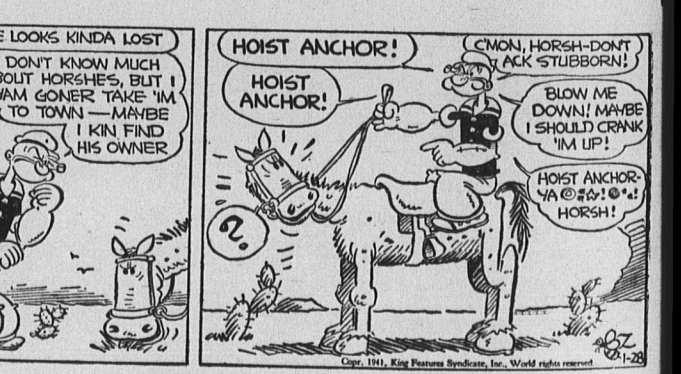
