## TUNNEY'S TRIUMPH'S IN RING STEPPINGSTONES TO WIN BRIDE

Title Holder Disliked Ring But Was Spurred On By Desire To Mingle On Even Terms With Family Of Bride-To-Be.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The love fighters raw was leering at Tunney of a man for a maid has given the world its most remarkable heavy-weight pugilist. He is Gene Tunney, now retired, and the maid is Mary Josephine Lauder, daughter of one of the country's first and richest families. They will be married this autumn or winter probably in New York. The rumored engagement of the champion and the Greenwich, Conn., society girl was confirmed last night in an announcement made by friends of Tunney, and of Mrs. George Lauder, Jr., the mother of Miss Lauder, at Mrs. Lauder's request. Only with that announcement did it become possible to tell the true story of why Gene Tunney not only became a champion and a millionaire, but also how he became a Shakespearean scholar, a man of culture and a man outside of all precedent of both society and the prize ring. He had received into the salons and drawing rooms of the elite. The story when told removes the mystery from the activities of Tunney while champion, activities which often brought him jeers from the followers of pugilism. As gathered from friends of Tunney and of the Lauder family the romance goes back five or six years when Mary Josephine Lauder was a girl of about 16. Tunney was a friend of her brother-in-law, Edward Dewing of Hartford Conn.

## 1928 RIFLE SHOOT OUTSTANDING EVENT

D. C. R. A. Expect Best Shoot In Canadian History At Connaught Ranges, With Australians And English Cadets Present.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 10.—Canada's National Rifle Shooting meeting, commonly known as the D. C. R. A. (Dominion of Canada Rifle Association) opens at Connaught Ranges, near Ottawa, on Aug. 13 and continues to Aug. 17. It is expected 800 competitors will take part. The association brings at its own expense teams of 16 riflemen from each of the provinces. Riflemen will be right to have their expenses thus paid by their shooting at provincial meets. The association also refunds 20 percent of the railway fares of the contestants not on the provincial team. In addition to the Canadians this year, seven of the Australians who are returning from Bisleby via Canada will take part and a team of 12 English cadets will also compete. Last year almost 500 riflemen competed and there is a marked increase in rifle shooting since then. Last winter 510 teams throughout the country took part in the D. C. R. A. winter indoor competitions as compared with 126 teams two years ago.

## Tunney Takes Stock

Tunney found her an altogether charming young woman. After his usual thoughtful method of operation he took stock of himself. He was a young prize fighter, just getting a little more than started. He had just about enough money to finance himself from one fight to another. His education was that of the common schools and the marines. His social position was that of the son of Irish immigrants, born in Greenwich village, N. Y. and turned prize fighter.
