Hon. A. Meighen Replies to Fielding

Hon. Mr. Meighen in House of Commons on March 18th stated that he wished to deal chiefly with the speech of Hon. Mr. Fielding. Before discussing it, however, he referred to some remarks which the member for East Middlesex (Mr. Ross) had made in connection with a resolution asking for a substantial reduction in the duty on farm implements...

The Titles Debate.

Referring to Mr. Fielding's remarks regarding the stand taken last session by the Prime Minister on titles, Mr. Meighen said that the position was as follows: In view of the volume of public attention which titles had been attracting, the Government had reached a decision in regard to its policy. That decision was embodied in an order-in-council and communicated to the Government of Great Britain.

As Member Last House

Mr. Meighen went on to refer to Mr. Fielding's comment on the War Times Election Act. In this regard Mr. Meighen defined himself as speaking as a member of the House and of the late administration and in no way as speaking on behalf of the present Government as now constituted.

Disfranchised Britons.

Replying to the charge made by Mr. Fielding that disfranchisement under the War Times Election Act had led to indulging in trickery, deception and deceit, Mr. Meighen said that when the former was Premier of Nova Scotia he was responsible for the disfranchisement of British subjects in that province who were in the employ of the Government of Canada.

Canada and Peace Conference

Mr. Fielding, said Mr. Meighen, had given it as his opinion that President Wilson was sound and logical in objecting to Canada's having her own delegates at the peace conference. With this view he absolutely disagreed. It was difficult for him he said, to comprehend how the former Minister of Finance could arrive at his conclusion that there were not subjects under discussion at the conference in which Canada was directly interested.
