BERLIN, Dec. 3.—Germany has turned to her own storm center, Bavaria, for a Chancellor. Adam Stegerwald, born in Bavaria and former Premier of Prussia was endeavoring today to knit together the fragments of a stable cabinet having been given a mandate by President Ebert.

There was no early word to the effect that he has had any more success than others who tried since Stresemann, a member of the right wing of the Center party, is a politician of ability and an able economist. He is a leader of the christian trade unionists and a writer on social subjects.

Stegerwald's summons of the Chancellor came at a moment when the capital seethed with most imposing array of police, bayonets, tanks and other trappings to pickings of war seen since 1918. Searchlights played through snow and rain, straining through the slush of a disagreeable winter day to pick out Communists supposedly staging a Moscow inspired demonstration.
