THEY DID NOT REFUSE TO ENDORSE

Every day, in speaking of the favor with which the Tunnel project has seized upon the minds of the great commercial centres of Canada, some one of the little coterie of objectors is heard to ask, "But what about the Toronto Manufacturer's Association?" As a certain number of papers published telegraphic reports declaring that this important organization had refused to endorse the scheme, and even extended the refusal in their glaring headlines to the Toronto Board of Trade, it seems necessary to inform the public that no opposition, not even the spirit of the least unfriendliness has ever been manifested towards us and our dearest ambition by the great Canadian Manufacturer's Association. In the first place, we are informed by Rev. Father Burke that the presence of a delegation from the Manufacturers, at the Board of Trade meeting he addressed in Toronto, was altogether unexpected. A number of the members were anxious to attend and, while he was quite anxious to place the Island's claim before all influential bodies, he left it to the Board of Trade, as was quite proper, to say who should or who should not attend their meeting. When before them he gave them all the available information on all phases of the communication question. The figures as to imports are altogether problematical—unfortunately we cannot get at the exact ones—but those given were rather within that without the mark. When his address was over and the numerous questions answered, Messrs Howland, Gage, Allan, Blain and others spoke most flatteringly of it and approvingly of its object; then the Manufacturers' representatives, and its transportation expert particularly, declared themselves captivated with the scheme and publicly asked Father Burke to present it to their numerous readers in their great journal, Industrial Canada, a duty he was delighted to take upon himself.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association are not as everyone knows, a public body like the boards of trade; and, therefore, they should not be expected, and were not expected to take up political or quasi-political questions like provincial relations; but in so far as trade in manufactured goods was concerned they were deeply interested and moved. The telegrams published then put them in a false light as well as ourselves, and hence the Association writes through its secretary and other officials to complain. In a letter to Father Burke, Secretary Young makes haste to say that whilst the Association did not call upon the Government to build the Tunnel as such action was not within its province, "I can say without hesitation that the committee considering the matter appeared unanimously to favor the proposition so far as their individual views were concerned." The Minute of Council passed, a copy of which is before us, shows exactly the same warm and friendly feeling. No doubt the Tunnel will find in manufacturers its warmest supporters. Indeed, a member of the Association writes us: "If all your friends are disposed to work as well or half as well as the manufacturers then the Tunnel will soon come." Mr. G. M. Murray, editor of Industrial Canada, provoked at the damaging reports circulated, writes inter alia: "The reporters seem according to this, to have conveyed the impression that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association has refused to endorse Prince Edward Island's proposal, which, of course, is certainly not the case." J. F. M. Stewart, Asst. Secy, writes, in reply to the query of a member,—"Although I did not see the report in the press, I believe that it was stated in one of the papers so as to convey the impression that the Association opposed the Tunnel. I have had the assurance of the reporters of the Mail and Globe that the same would be looked into, and if found to be the case, corrected in their papers. I have been unable however, to locate the mischievous paragraph."

Thus it would amply appear that the Canadian Manufacturers' Association is not against the Tunnel, does not refuse to endorse the Tunnel; but is anxious to be regarded as amongst its warmest friends. We admire its patriotic attitude and commend it to others—those who have been persistent to remark: "What about the Toronto Manufacturers' Association?" It behoves the press publishing erroneous and misleading despatches, too, whether here or elsewhere, to make the necessary amends.

THE PARK ROADWAY.

There is no question raised as to the expediency of permitting the Gentlemen's Club to use the Park Roadway at certain hours in the evening" as The Examiner states. The use of the Roadway is now open to gentlemen or non-gentlemen, on foot or horseback or in carriages, not merely at certain hours but at all hours of the day or night. But the use of the Roadway for a race course is another and altogether different thing.

Nobody proposes that "the Gentlemen's Club shall be forbidden to drive and show their fine horses and carriages on the Park Roadway at special times," as The Examiner intimates. But objection is taken to giving up the Roadway to the exclusive use of certain privileged persons during certain hours. Objection is taken to limiting in an unlawful manner the privileges of the many for the pleasure of the few. It is not a question of expediency but a question of right; not a question of restricting the Gentlemen's Driving Club from doing any lawful or proper thing, but of restricting the immemorial right of the mass of the people to use a public highway at their pleasure and at any time.

What is proposed is beyond the power of the City Council or of the Governor in Council to authorize. Let us assume that the City Council should attempt to grant the proposed concession, specifying, say, Friday evening between the hours of six and eight o'clock for the exclusive use of the Roadway by the Gentlemen's Driving Club. The humblest individual in the city driving a cart-horse, mule or jack-ass at a walking pace over the Roadway within the prescribed hours could set the Club at defiance and be quite within his legal rights.

Public highways are not made for the exclusive use of gentlemen; the roads and streets are for all, gentle or rough, well dressed or ill-dressed, washed or unwashed. It is not necessary to discuss in this connection the question of the safety of foot passengers, or of women and children who might desire to cross or drive upon the Roadway during the prescribed hours, although that has an important bearing on the proposal. Nor is it necessary to discuss the popularising of the Park. What is proposed is a distinct invasion of public rights which it is the duty of all good citizens to guard.
