THE COOK'S CORNER

PICKLED PLUMS

8 lbs. plums
4 lbs. sugar
1 tablespoon whole cloves
6 inch stick cinnamon
2 quarts mild vinegar
Method: Choose well ripened plums for this and wipe them well. Pack them into hot, sterile jars. Boil the vinegar, sugar and spices

and pour this over the plums. Let stand for three days, then drain off the liquid and again heat it to the boiling point and pour over the fruit. Let stand 3 days longer, then repeat the draining off of the syrup and refilling the jars. Let the jars stand another 3 days, then seal. Do not open for at least 2 weeks.

UNCOOKED TOMATO RELISH

Eight pounds ripe, firm tomatoes, 7 large onions, 5 cups chopped green celery, 2 sweet red peppers, 1 cup salt, 6 cups granulated sugar, 2 1/2 ounces white mustard seed. Peel tomatoes, cut them up, and add to the peeled and chopped onions. Then put the celery with them, and run all through the food chopper. Sprinkle with salt, mix thoroughly and turn into a double square of cheesecloth, and let drain overnight. In the morning place the sugar in a kettle, add 2 cups white wine vinegar, the chopped peppers and the mustard seed, and place over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat, add the tomato mixture, stir well, and place in sterilized jars. Delicious with cold meats.

Green vegetables — peas, beans, asparagus and greens — should be cooked quickly in an uncovered kettle and should be served as soon as they are done. Never let vegetables stand in water.

Casserole dishes made of meat, vegetables or fish can be cooked in the morning and reheated just before they are to be served.

MODERNIZE YOUR BEDROOM WITH RED, WHITE AND BLUE

If you want to modernize your bedroom, you can do it in a flash with a new dressing table ensemble done in patriotic colors. Use of bold, clear red, white and blue for a slipcovered mirror, picture frames and dressing table cup set will transform a frayed-at-the-edges bedroom. With modern sewing machine attachments it's an easy matter to make a lampshade to match, trimmed with regimental-looking cotton fabric.

Dressing table skirt hems are turned up and finished in a few minutes, if you use the adjustable hemmer. And you'll find that corded, pleated and ruffled trappings are easy to accomplish if you use the cording foot, pleater and ruffler attachments. For the mirror and pictures, the front width of the slipcover frame is determined more or less by the width and size of the original frame.

STOCKING SAVERS

Darn toes before over wearing silk hose, and run round the tops of the feet with the very latest machine so that if the suspenders start a ladder, it is caught. Put tiny sniplets from old stockings on to where the suspenders clip.

DON'T SKIMP ON CURTAIN MATERIAL

If you have very wide windows in your home, the very latest thing you will want to do is skimp on curtain material. If you are buying material by the yard, figure full measurement, for you will want an effect of generous fullness. If you are buying ready-made curtains, one pair of very wide ones may be sufficient. Otherwise you may need two or even three pairs of narrow width curtains for each window.

Light color suedes, pale blues, greens, beige, are effective and practical choices for the coats with light fur trimmings, notably Canadian lynx. Set-in belts look right for these flattering light coats.

Deep pile suede jersey in light and bright shades for street dresses on simple lines, especially effective under dark coats.

DECORATIVE HATPINS

Hatpins have gone into the diminutive class in so far as length is concerned, but they are really important as a practical and decorative detail. The latter angle is played down, for hatpins are made of the hat medium and as such blend smoothly into the background. Usually they are ball shape, but spike or loose shapes are liked so, and they are thrust into deep backs to hold them on, or through crowns both as a "steadier" and a decoration.

QUILTED CUSHION COVERS

Quilted articles will usually wash satisfactorily as long as the correct method is used. After removing the quilted cover from the cushion it should be shaken to remove surplus dust and then washed by immersing it in a suds of pure soap and lukewarm water. Squeeze gently to remove dirt but do not twist or rub. Rinse thoroughly squeeze out water and roll in a heavy towel and press out excess moisture. When it is drying, shake the cover slightly to remove creases. While still damp iron lightly with a warm iron to give a good finish.

GUARD AGAINST SUMMER COLDS

Did you know that a good many of those puzzling summer colds may be the direct result of skipping right from a hot, steamy bathroom out into the cool, maybe-drafty house? When you take your whipped cream lather bath today, try putting the cold water in first and then adding the hot. You'll find you'll be able to enjoy your hundred percent cleansing without the slightest trace of steam to bother you!

WALNUT REFINISHER

After cleaning your walnut furniture with a commercial paint and varnish remover, wash well with gasoline. Then give it three filler coats of three parts boiled linseed oil and one part turpentine, filling it until the wood has absorbed all it can and feels sticky. Wash off the surplus with gasoline. Then when thoroughly dry, apply a coat of liquid wax. Walnut furniture may be washed with mild soap and water, dried quickly and re waxed.

Remember, when using gasoline to exert the most exacting care. Avoid too much friction and the locality of the stove.

The ideal way to put linens away is to roll them. Mailing tubes are excellent, so are broom handles, window-shade rollers or sections of poles on which rugs may have been rolled. Store linens in a cool — not hot or dry — place.
