Direction For Shipping Silver Fox Skins

TO MESSRS. C. M. LAMPSON & CO. LONDON, FROM PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND REGISTERED MAIL OR EXPRESS FOR THE YEAR 1924, AND UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.

Silver Fox intended for Messrs. C. M. Lampson & Co's London Sales should be shipped by registered mail, or by express, if more convenient.

If shipped by registered mail, the skins should be packed in parcels weighing not over 4 lbs. 6 oz., the outer covering of which should be of unbleached muslin of similar material; and the following address should be plainly marked on the outside of the package: Messrs. C. M. Lampson & Co., 64 Queen St. London, E. C. 4, England

In addition, the shipper's name and address should be placed on the outside of the package, to enable Messrs. Lampson & Co. to identify it on arrival, and packages should be numbered consecutively from No. 1 upwards.

Furs consigned to Messrs. Lampson & Co. by registered mail or by express may be insured under the terms of their open policies from the time they leave the shipper's possession until delivered to their destination, but they cannot be insured by Messrs. Lampson & Co. if forwarded by regular parcel post.

If insurance under the terms of Messrs. Lampson & Co's. open policies is desired, the above instructions should be carefully followed, and a letter of advice must be sent to Alfred Fraser, 212 Fifth Avenue, New York, N. Y., stating the number of packages shipped, the number of skins in each package, and the amount of insurance desired. The post office receipt or express receipt must accompany the letter of advice.
