children born in Belfast," P. E. I.; and after living for a time with his widowed mother in Orwell purchased near Orwell cross-roads, fronting on Fletcher's road, an homestead from Louisa Augusta, Lady Wood, and Maria Matilda Fanning, daughters of Governor Fanning. Their son John Angus was born here, and here he died.

The wife of John Angus MacQueen, Isabella Nicholson, was the daughter of Peter Nicholson, the son of Donald Nicholson, miller and magistrate in Orwell, P. E. I.

Peter Nicholson, miller of Orwell, P. E. I., married Marion Munro, daughter of Dr. James Munro, Kilmuir, Skye, Scotland, who died at Tobermory, Isle of Mull, Scotland, when ready for sailing, for P. E. I. After his death in 1840, the family came to P.E.I. took up land and settled in Alberry Plains.

One son of the Munro family, Donald, a brother of Marion (Mrs. Peter Nicholson) was known as "Doctor" Munro, who though he had but an incomplete medical course, because there was no physician in his district for years, devoted himself to healing and helping his neighbours.

Through Anabella MacLeod, the wife of Dr. James Munro, great-grandparents of Malcolm A. MacQueen, Mr. MacQueen is a descendant of King Robert the Bruce, King Robert II and of several Barons of Sleat, Skye, Scotland.

Of Isabella Nicholson it is written, "Her knowledge of history, and of the involved inter relations of families, not only in her native province, but among the great in foreign lands, was so intimate that she was known among her friends as the 'historian'."

To John Angus and Isabella (Nicholson) MacQueen were born James; Matilda Brown, widow of Walter Ross of Kinross, P. E. I.; Peter Isaac of Orwell, P. E. I.; and Malcolm Alexander (of Winnipeg) who married Harriet Murtagh of Winnipeg; and five other children who died in youth.

In 1804 or 1805 Donald Nicholson the grandfather of Isabella, the mother of Malcolm MacQueen, who operated the mill on Crwell River returned to Skye to marry his bride Isabella Nicholson, and on the voyage encountered a very heavy storm. "After the storm had abated, he composed a Gaelic poem, which during the early history of Belfast, was on everyone's lips. In this poem, the author recounts the violence of the storm and the danger to ship and passengers."

"In 1805 or 1806 he returned to P. E. I. with his bride, on the 'Rambler,' bringing several new immigrants from Skye, who settled in Flat River and Belle River districts."

The ship "Polly" referred to in connection with Lord Selkirk and early settlers from Skye and nearby sections of Scotland, was not forgotten by the Belfast district. In 1804, to mark the centenary of the founding of the Belfast district, Belfast is a corruption of the French "La Belle Face," and is founded on the abandoned site of a French colony whose members were deported to France, after the surrender of Louisbourg in 1758. Hence the French cemetery by the shore at Eidon, "the descendants of the pioneers and their friends, at the entrance to the graveyard, and beautiful grounds around the Belfast Church, erect-

ed a monument bearing the following inscription, with one in Gaelic to the same effect.

"IN MEMORY of the arrival of the Scottish Immigrants who came to this island by Lord Selkirk's ships, The Polly, Dykes and Oughton, in August 1803, and made homes for themselves and their children in the woods of Belfast. In memory of this ship "Polly," the Mt. Buchanan cemetery, which was the first cemetery to be opened by the Scottish settlers in the district, is now known as "The Polly Cemetery." The old French cemetery was first, for a time, used. Later a parcel of land was set aside by Dr. Angus MacAulay, from his estate, for a cemetery, and it is there the Doctor, is interred. This burial place was called Cleachad an leighnach (The Doctor's burying-ground) and is now known as above referred to, "The Polly Cemetery." The first person buried in this cemetery was one of the Doctor's children. Dr. MacAulay was one of Selkirk's emigrants, and after his death in 1827, until 1840, there was no trained physician in the district. After 1840, the district had Donald Munro of Alberry Plains, already mentioned, to labour in that profession for some time. In the Belfast Cemetery, the second burial place to be opened, lay the remains of Mary Douglas, who is declared by the tombstone erected to her memory as the only daughter of Lord Selkirk. Of her we read: Mary Douglas "was placed by the Earl in care of Thomas Halliday, a skilled Scottish stonemason of good education and excellent character. When he and his family arrived in 1806, accompanied by their adopted ac-

ter then seven years old, he was given a farm near the present Holliday's Wharf (in Eidon). Mary was dowried with certain adjoining lands. He is a barrister and holds an office in connection with the Northern Trust Co.

"In loving memory of Mary Douglas, only daughter of Lord Selkirk, died October 1859, Aet 60. Blessed are the dead, Who die in the Lord."

Malcolm A. MacQueen received his B.A. degree at Queen's University. He taught in Ugg School in 1888-89. He is a barrister and holds an office in connection with the Northern Trust Co. Mr. MacQueen wrote a book entitled "Skye Pioneers and The Island," a most interesting study of the early days of Belfast, Orwell, Ugg and Kinross.

It may be of interest to know that some of the stones of the old grist mill erected by Donald Nicholson about 1830, were afterwards donated by his son Peter Nicholson for use in the imposing structure of the Roman Catholic Church then being built in Veonon River. "This exhibition of Christian charity and brotherhood on the part of a neighbour outside the pale of his church, was a source of great satisfaction to the parish priest, Rev. James Phalen."

It may also be of interest to know that Malcolm MacLeod, whose daughter Christina married Donald MacQueen, of Glasgow, Belfast, is the direct Scottish ancestor one of Selkirk's settlers, of the MacLeods of Pinette and Eidon. One of the descendants was the late Rev. Malcolm MacLeod of Eidon, one time a minister in New York, son of the late Donald A. MacLeod, and his wife, the late Ann MacKenzie of Flat River, whose two sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) Harry Johnston and Mrs. Arthur Putnam live in Charlottetown. Also, one of the descendants of this Malcolm MacLeod is Cyrus MacLeod of Winnipeg, who is employed with the T. Eaton Co., Ltd., son of the late Angus MacLeod and his wife, the late Catherine MacRae of Mt. Buchanan, Belfast.

The attention of cattle owners is directed to the Warble Fly Control Policy of the Department of Agriculture. Under this Policy groups of six or more bona fide farmers in any area may secure on proper application to the Department sufficient quantities of Warble Fly powder at a charge of not more than 30c per pound. The application should give the names and addresses of farmers, the number of cattle owned by each to be treated, the quantity of material required, and be accompanied by the amount necessary to cover the cost of such material.
