SECOND SAINTS LOSE TO P. W. C. SQUAD 9-3

Capt. Walters Aroused By Change Of Scene For Third Race Of Series

(By Tom Horgan, Associated Press Sports Writer)
GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 16—A thick fog and absence of a breeze today held up the third race between two schooners of the sailing championship of the North Atlantic, and once more the doughty contestants made read for battle off this old fishing port.
Captain Angus Walters had taken Bluenose, the big Canadian defender of the International Fisherman's Trophy, donated by Senator W. H. Dennis, Halifax publisher, to Boston, with the expectation of a race today with the American challenger, Gertrude L. Thebaud, but conditions proved impossible.
Captain Ben Pins left his home port here shortly after dawn with the Thebaud under tow, but the vessel was still in the harbor when she struck hard on a submerged rock.
Captain Pins immediately turned about and had the challenger hauled out on the marine railway at Rocky Neck, where damage was found to be slight.
The United States captain asked the race committee for a postponement and the group decided that the next race would be sailed off Gloucester Tuesday—twice around an 18-mile triangle. The committee, before hearing of Thebaud's mishap, had set the race for tomorrow.
Each schooner has won one race in the three-out-of-five series—Thebaud off Nahant last Sunday and Bluenose off Gloucester Thursday.
The change of scene aroused the ire of Captain Walters. "What do they think I have here, a Halifax ferry boat?" he asked.
Pins applied to the Thebaud just before the series started last Sunday was found to have blistered and peeled in a manner which would have slowed a garbage scow.
Captain Cecil Moulton, one of her crew, who took Thebaud to the fishing banks on many trips, described the challenger as a "mouthing old hen."
Commodore Wallace Macaskill of Halifax resigned his place on the race committee, declaring he saw little purpose remaining in a member since he never was consulted by the other members.
The Commodore said he was leaving immediately for Halifax. E. W. Zwicker, who owns a part of Bluenose, was elected in his stead.

Commodore McIntyre On Visit Here With View Of Forming Life Saving Corps

Commodore Louis McIntyre of New York, a native of Charlottetown arrived in the city Friday night. Commodore McIntyre, commanding the New York State United States Volunteer Life Saving Guards hopes to organize a Royal Canadian Life Saving Corps here. He wants 25 young men, college age, for a life saving corps. The Commodore announced that groups could be started in all the Maritime provinces and he would gladly assist in the instruction. Some of the finest material would be selected and used as a nucleus. He wants to build other life saving corps in the Maritime. It was said.
Commodore McIntyre, who is a retired U. S. Navy University physical director, has been a member of the U. S. V. Life Saving Guards for 20 years.
A fine physical specimen himself the Commodore outlined physical development in an interview last night. The talk centred on the subject of boxing generally and then on the squared circle sport in this province.
"I'll bet \$25 with anyone I can take any untrained man, whom I will pick, and after a week's training put him against any boxer in the province—in his weight class—and defeat the boxer," Commodore McIntyre declared. "Sure put it in the paper," he continued. "I'm ready to take it up any time."
Returning to the subject of life saving, the speaker said if a station were organized here he would be glad to come down Dominion Day and conduct tests.
Tests for a first class life guard included: The candidate must swim 300 yards out in surf, fully clothed; take off clothes and put them in boat; rest one minute, then a representative of the life guards will ask the candidate six different ways; the candidate must break the six different holds and carry the examiner back to the shore.
He would remain in the city three weeks to a month, Commodore McIntyre said, if there was any interest taken in the organization of a Life Saving Corps here.

Keating Signs Contract With Providence

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 16—(CP)—Jackie Keating said tonight he had signed a contract to join Providence Reds in the International-American League. Last spring he announced he was retiring from hockey. German Tennis Ace Released From Prison

BERLIN, Oct. 16—(AP)—Baron Gottfried Von Cramm, German tennis ace, was released on parole today from Lehrterstrasse prison where he had almost five months still to serve on a morals charge.
The remainder of his one-year sentence, which would have been up next March 7, will be suspended for two years during which he "must prove worthy of this act of mercy."
A large automobile awaited Baron Von Cramm outside the prison gate and he was taken to an undisclosed destination. It was known, however, that he was called for by his brother and it was believed he was taken to his mother's home at Bruegen, near Hannover.
Baron Von Cramm was arrested March 5 on his return from a tennis tour of the United States and Australia. He was convicted by a criminal court jury May 14 of improper relations with an 18-year-old Jew, Manasse Herbst, but the two months he had waited in custody trial were deducted from his term.
In prison he had been doing clerical work, and therefore was in his cell only at night.

Training Hard For Bout With Nemis

Bennie Binns is in hard training for his fight with Johnny Nemis of Cape Breton which takes place at the Sporting Club Saturday night next. Binns, surprising in his fine showing against George Graham, is already well down to his normal weight and the way he is slapping sparring partners around these days is an indication that fans will see a brilliant bout when the pair of hard-hitting boys tangle.
Nemis is also reported as taking the bout very seriously and will enter the ring in perfect condition for the defence of his Maritime middleweight championship.
In the semi-final Tom Claybourne, clever and hard-hitting southpaw batter will tangle with a mid-slinger from Amherst, N. S. Although Claybourne's opponent's name was not divulged nevertheless the rumour was that he will give the local heavy loads of opposition all the way.

Junior Line To Play In Amherst

It won't be Charlottetown's fault if Amherst's St. Pauls don't go places in the coming hockey season. Over the weekend a complete forward line comprised of John "Patsy" Wintlock, Oliver "Buddy" MacEachern and Elton "Buffer" Worth set out for the Nova Scotia town.
The trio started with the Rangers midweek back in "Big Four" days under Johnny Williams and were brought along for a number of years before they graduated into the junior ranks where last year they were members of the Abergaville team known as the Junior Abergavilles which pocketed the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island title. They lost out on the Maritime title to the Halifax Canadians.
A smart trio of hockeyists, who have played together so long that now each man knows practically every move that the three boys are going to make, the three boys should prove to be a valuable line this season.
Philadelphia Athletics, managed by Connie Mack, started on the championship at Philadelphia 28 years ago today with a 4-1 victory over Chicago. The A's won the title also in 1911, 1913, 1929 and 1930 and Mack still leads the club from the bench.
