

Final Standing Of Parties In Australia

MELBOURNE, Oct. 9. — (AP) — Counting of preference under proportional representation in Australia Sept. 21 general election was declared complete today, and the final standing of the parties showed that the coalition government of Prime Minister R. G. Menzies will have a majority of one in the new house of representatives after a speaker has been chosen. This compares with a working majority of one in the old house. The final standing:—

In the Senate the Government will have 19 seats against 17 for Labor, but till July 1, 1941, when the newly-elected senators are seated the Government will continue with 21 seats to Labor's 15.

The proposed structure remains in suspense pending meetings of the cabinet in Canberra next week, when the Labor Party will consider Mr. Menzies' offer of portfolios in an advisory national government. At present many indications that Labor will regard its earlier refusal. The Labor Party in New South Wales, where the party is the leader of the Opposition, said it is a committee of the party to be formed to discuss the offer.

Mr. G. Cameron, leader of the Country party, is endeavoring to convince Mr. Menzies to Sir Zaria Page, former leader of the Country party, between whom there has been a long-standing personal enmity. While directed at conserving the party strength, these efforts to produce solidarity in the ministerial and opposition groups may yet produce a national government.

7 Outstanding 1940 Horses Invited To Race

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 9. — (AP) — The Maryland Jockey Club announced today the "seven outstanding horses of 1940" had been invited to race Nov. 1 in the Pimlico Special "to determine the outstanding horse of the year." Those invited were Seabiscuit, Chaldean, Bimelech, Fencilon, land, Hash and Eight Thirty. The invitations to Seabiscuit, Bimelech and Eight Thirty—all now out of training—were in compliment to their achievements last year. The purse will be \$10,000, winner-take-all.

Reproduction Of Military Devices Strictly Prohibited

OTTAWA, Oct. 9. — (CP) — Manufacture, reproduction or sale of any military device is prohibited without written permission by or on behalf of the Defence Minister whenever such emblem or device is so similar to that used by or adopted for any of His Majesty's forces as to be likely to be mistaken for the official ones, the National Defence Department announced today. In a statement, the department said attention was being drawn to this prohibition because the war has made military uniforms and emblems popular. The prohibition applies "to the manufacturing, printing, displaying, painting, using or reproducing in any form or manner for any commercial purpose of any uniform of His Majesty's naval, military or air forces, or any portion of a uniform or badge insignia decoration, medals, awards, battle honors, emblems or devices used by or adopted by the forces."

BELEIVED STALLING CAUSED CRASH

MELBOURNE, Oct. 9. — (AP) — The airplane crash at Canberra Aug. 13 which cost the lives of three Australian cabinet ministers and seven others, was probably caused by the stalling of the Lockheed Hudson bomber at a height which gave the pilot insufficient space to recover control, Mr. Justice Lowe of the Supreme Court of Victoria reported today after investigating the crash.

STRIKE AVERTED

OSHAWA, Ont., Oct. 9. — (CP) — A threatened strike of 310 employees of the General Motors motor Canadian plant here was averted tonight. In a statement following a mass meeting of members of the Oshawa local of the United Automobile Workers of America the union said that 78 employees of the body shop who precipitated the crisis when they left their jobs last Friday will return to work tomorrow morning.

Victory For Reds Seen Best Thing For Baseball

By JUDSON BAILEY Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Oct. 9. — (AP) — The best thing that could have happened to baseball was the victory of Cincinnati in the world series, they made a "National League year" out of 1940, and restored the game to the competitive system. Even the American Leaguers admit privately that the one-sidedness was getting unhealthily.

It was a victory for the time-tested standards of baseball—that pitching is 70 per cent. of the game and that smartness is as good as strength.

Out of the pit into which the National League had fallen, came a courageous combination from the smallest city in the major leagues to overthrow the "superior beings" who inhabited their rival territory.

The whole Cincinnati organization is an efficient unit, but most of the credit, of course, goes to Will W. McKee, who also guided two National League all-star collections to triumph over the American League this year—first in Florida last March and again in St. Louis in July.

Newark Bears Win Little World Series

NEWARK, N.J., Oct. 9. — (CP) — Knuckle-baller Steve Peck, who won 15 of his 16 games for the Bears, during the regular season, was the only extra base player to capture the 1940 little world series in the sixth game here tonight by a 6-1 score before 4,500 chilled fans in Ruppert Stadium.

The Bears, who became finalists in the International League playoffs by whipping Jersey City and Baltimore Orioles, won the Minor League baseball classic four games to two.

The Colonels, who won the 1939 little world series, took the third and fourth games of the series, all on the hurling of Tex Hugen.

It marked the third time Newark has won the series, taking the classic in 1932 and 1937. The International League now has won the annual series 10 times to the American association's 12.

Louisville, a poor fourth in the association, first defeated Columbus and then opened the first-place Cincinnati Reds, like the Bears a New York farm club.

Tonight's game started off as a pitcher's duel between Peck and Wagner, who went into the game with a 12-game winning streak.

The Colonels broke the ice in the first half of the fourth game, second baseman Vince Sherlock opened with a triple—the only extra base hit in the game—and crossed the plate on Chet Morgan's single.

Bud Metheny evened it up for the Bears in their half when he cleared his first home run of the series. Both sides threatened in the fifth. The Bears forged ahead in the sixth as big Ed Levy singled, moved to second on Sherlock's error and raced home on Leo Nomenkamp's one base.

A three-run blast in the seventh inning clinched the game for Newark. With two men on base Tommy Holmes tripped into deep right-center and then scored as Sherlock threw wild to third on the relay from the outfield. Alex Kampouris, who counted four runs in the series, followed with a triple down the third base line, but was stranded there.

The Bears got their final run off Pressnel, who went to the mound in the eighth after Wagner had been lifted for a pinch hitter, Henry Majeski, first man to face the former Brooklyn Dodger hurler, doubled to right, was sacrificed to third and scored on a perfect squeeze play by Tom Padden.

Louisville got two men on in the ninth but the Bears' center fielder, who had a fast double play. All in all Peck faced only 30 men, struck out five and walked two.

The crowd was the smallest of the series as holly weather prevailed.
