Smith, who also left a note saying: "I have gone to join mother." Her mother died last year. Her husband, Harold Smith, died in 1919.

The suicide theory was partially dispelled today by the fact that the young widow's car was found by the police yesterday on a boulevard near Long Beach, where it had been left early Monday afternoon. Residents said a woman left the car with a heavy suitcase walking toward Long Beach.

Those investigating believe that Mrs. Smith is a passenger under an assumed name on one of four liners sailing from Los Angeles Monday night. Wireless communication with the vessels shows no passenger of her name. It is believed that Mrs. Smith is sailing under an assumed name for reasons known not even to her father. Her father says she had been afflicted with melancholia since her mother died and that lately she has had hallucinations that she heard her mother calling her. A graduate of the University of Toronto, Mrs. Smith was a talented pianist.

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Would Limit Number of Jewish Students

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Mar 6.—Syracuse University had a new sensation today, says the Syracuse Herald, when it became known that the senior council had appointed a committee of three members to propose a limitation on admission of Jewish students.

The senior council, generally regarded as the governing board of the student body, met last night, says the Herald.

Although no official announcement was made today, its members said there was no formal resolution nor a written record made, but the council informally discussed and approved that steps be taken to limit admission of Jewish students.

A committee of three was appointed to confer with Chancellor Flint or Vice-Chancellor Graham, and possibly other administration officials on this question.

The chief reason for the action of the council is that Jewish male students are a whole, except lack interest in athletics, except basketball. It was said that the percentage of Jewish students who sought places on the football and athletic teams is small.

EPIDEMIC AMONG FOWLS. Poultry men in certain sections of Ontario, particularly around London and Stratford, according to reports, are greatly concerned about the rapid spread of an epidemic among chickens, which is believed to be a form of diphtheria or influenza. In one flock at Kitchener, recently, 50 chickens died within 24 hours, practically wiping out the flock. The birds in this flock belonged to Martin Mikel, a fancy poultry breeder of that city.

The disease seems to strike the chickens in the throat and from post-mortems performed by Mr. Mikel on the dead chickens it has been ascertained that a thick greyish matter mixed with dark blood clogs the birds' throats, cutting off the air supply until they smother and die.

Other poultry breeders throughout the city are reporting similar experiences, and unless the epidemic is checked it is feared that many of the best and highest priced birds will be lost.

Some poultry experts call this pneumonia or a type of the flu. They recommend giving Epsom salts in wet mash and a little potassium permanganate in their drinking water. Meanwhile poultry men are investigating the disease more thoroughly and experimenting with various forms of treatment. A St. Thomas (Ont.) man claims to have discovered a sure cure, which is being tried out by the O. A. C. authorities.
