—COUNCIL MEETING.—The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held on Monday night, the Mayor and all the Council being present. The meeting was chiefly devoted to routine work and the passing of bills amounting to \$1045. Appeals for exemption of Poll Tax were received on behalf of Rev. J. F. Denny (deceased), Messrs. David Arbing, Jelas Poles and J. W. Clarke and were on motion granted. A motion was passed authorizing the Finance Committee to purchase Victory Bonds to the amount of \$7,500 for Sinking Fund purposes. A bill for \$25 from Mr. J. J. Johnston for counsel (to) as Attorney-General in matter of the Town versus Ray Tanton was received, read and laid over until next meeting. Reports were received from the various committees, Councillor Pope, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reporting that the several departments had all overdrawn their appropriations and must therefore economize for the balance of the year.

Let Government Know It Is Servant Of Law

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—"I think the people of Canada might do many more foolish things than take such action as would let the Government know that it is the servant of the law and not its master."

This was the declaration of R. L. Calder, K.C., Crown Prosecutor, in the course of an address delivered this evening.

"Too many people in politics today," he continued, "are content to wash the matter to the mast and let the ship of state go ahead, right or wrong. The first step in practical politics as I see it," he said, "is to make all Governments understand that they are servants of the people. My experience has been that the people are masters until they cast their ballots. After that they become mere servants, while their masters do not even try to do what they bound themselves to do."

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Five Indians

Because he was believed to be a wizard, a 15-year-old Indian named Moccasin is alleged to have been murdered by these Indians. He was hung head downwards from a tree with his hands tied behind him and left to freeze to death last winter when the weather was below zero. The body was taken down, beaten with rocks and buried. It is believed he was buried while still alive.

Since June the mounties have been at work on the case. To reach the territory of the Nez Percés was a heavy trail, traveled by a thousand miles on foot with pack dogs and their canoes on the dangerous upper Liard. They finally made camp in the neighborhood of the tribe, when the inspector was fired on. The officer, although he was heavily wounded, returned the fire. After weeks of searching for clues, they discovered a hole that had been scratched out by a wolf. Under the planks a few feet down they found the body of a boy, hands tied behind him.

One of the Indians came along at the time and, believing that another wizard had told the officers where the boy was buried, confessed. The confession was that the wizard had told the officers that Moccasin had a dream that Big Alex had a dream that the boy was a wizard.

There was a preliminary trial at Liard by Inspector Wunsch, who holds a commission as a magistrate.

The Indians in the Liard district are firm believers in witchcraft, and torturing and hanging those believed to be necromancers is said to be a common practice.

Later reports from the region say a girl named Madeline, suspected of witchcraft, was hung by a foot and arm for three days. She now walks like a crab, mostly on one foot and one hand using the injured arm and leg for balancing.

The Court House was but moderately filled, but all present exhibited a deep interest in the matter under discussion, namely, the electric lighting contract to be entered into on the expiration of the present contract on the 15th November, next. Mr. A. F. MacArthur was called to the chair and Mr. F. L. Rogers appointed secretary. The chairman briefly explained the object of the meeting and called upon the mayor to give further explanations and also upon the several Town Councillors to give their version of the matter. Councillors Profit, Leard, Barbour, White spoke at some length and gave much valuable information and they were followed by Messrs. M. R. Leard, Waugh, Rogers, Tanton, Tompson Wilson and others. The matter was discussed at some length and much information given to the assembly upon different phases of the question. Mr. W. Tanton, M. L. A., went into the matter more deeply than other speakers and gave much valuable information. While not in full accord with the object of the meeting what he said was to the point and was received with full appreciation by the citizens and the Council. The following resolution, moved by Mr. F. L. Rogers and seconded by Mr. George Gard was put to the meeting and carried unanimously:

Resolved, that whereas the present electric light contract expires on the 15th November, next, and whereas the Town Council has endeavored to obtain a two years extension of the contract with slight variations and whereas the Leard Electric Light project have so far declined to meet the new contract proposed by the Town Council and have not encouraged any negotiations towards getting together:

Therefore Resolved, that the citizens of Alberton in town meeting assembled, hereby confirm and express their full confidence in their civic representatives in such further negotiations as may be necessary to have the matter settled.
