Canadians Buy Many Cars, Trucks OTTAWA, Sept. 19 - (CP) - Canadian motorists paid a record \$158,000,000 for new vehicles last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today. While the 120,000 passenger and commercial vehicles sold in 1946 was still under the record 1937 total of 144,000, their purchase price was more than \$47,000,000 above the 1937 total. Passenger models sold last year had a value of \$102,000,000 and totaled 77,742. There were 42,000 trucks selling for \$73,000,000. The average purchase price in 1946 was the highest on record, reaching \$1,348 for passenger cars and \$1,728 for trucks. This compared with a pre-war average of between \$1,000 and \$1,100.
