### FOUND GERMAN AMMUNITION IN VANCOUVER HOUSE.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 20.—A British ammunition case containing about 500 German cartridges with soft-nosed bullets was removed by the Vancouver police from a house on Twentieth Avenue West today, where it has been found in a basement by a woman who recently moved into the house, which had been unoccupied for some time. The ammunition case was the regular British army type and bore the date 1901. The shells were of German manufacture, having been made at Karlsruhe, and were stamped with dates varying from 1882 to 1889.

### CHILD PLAYING WITH MATCHES IS BURIED TO DEATH.

HARLAND, N. B., Aug. 21.—A shocking fatality occurred at Rockland Thursday evening, when the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Clark was burned to death. The child had been playing with matches and her clothes caught fire. Before help could reach her the body had been practically burned to a crisp. The father was away at work and the mother was out berrying, leaving the victim and two other small children at home. Neighbors who came to the rescue were too late to save the child's life.

### P. E. ISLAND ROADS

Sir:—I was pleased to read an article in a recent issue of the Guardian descriptive of the splendid condition of the road from "Hillsboro Bridge" to "Eldon" think of it a road 22 mile all nicely rounded, smooth without a rut (with the exception of one place since been put in a good shape) This is a really something that never could be said since it was a road. It is pleasing especially to the Road Masters that their efforts, with the hearty support of "every" man in the country in meeting with the approval of the travelling public. The roadway under a concrete, unsystematic and expensive system of the late government were in a deplorable state, when taken in hand under the up-to-date, practical, universally satisfactory system of the present, or "Matheson" Government. That this statement is true, is shown by the fact, that it has taken four years of the united labor of almost the whole rural population, with horses and machines, man tax, horse and dog tax under the competent supervision of Road Masters (who vie with each other in having the best roads) to bring them up to their present good condition. And, I have yet to hear from one man, grit or tory, (with the exception of the Editor of the Patriot) anything but praise for the new system of road making. For this act alone the government ought and will receive the hearty support of every citizen, withstanding the abusive vaporing of the Patriot, who is so busy digging his party's grave, that he is blind to the improvements going on around him. At the inception of the road act the grits did their best to keep the road making looking for another accepting office. "Look at the time you'll lose, and bother for \$10-ha! ha! thought you'd more sense, you ought to have at least \$50 a year throw it up." And now the Patriot howls about the big salaries (although not the heavy support of the money used to get) and the tremendous cost of collecting the taxes. Compare the two systems, with the "results" and see which side the balance will be on. Under the nothing-doing system there were some 1000 overseers and I suppose the road makers had as many supervisors as a road master. They and their horses were exempt. Then there were Supervisors, with good salaries and a rake off on extra work, then the tax collectors. The most the overseers did was to try and get people to turn out to break up roads in winter. The road machine man and supervisor did as little as they could on the roads the way was done as far as possible by grits, the tories paid, under the new way every man has the right and privilege of working out his tax. The old party distinction is now a thing of the past, the money for the road to the best advantage, right under the eyes of the tax payer, not spent in some other district, or used for corrupt purposes. Likely the poor deluded Editor of the Patriot will soon be on the rampage through the Belfast district looking for another "Waterloo," let him note the difference of the roads now, to what they were when he met his defeat, and have the manliness to acknowledge the improvement. Just a word of advice to ye Editor of the Patriot, Belfast news writers, who there will soon be nominated another worthy son of the district who will stand shoulder to shoulder to look after rights, and work for the best interests of the district, none other need apply. Belfast never went back on her sons.

### THE HESSIAN FLY IN THE WEST.

The Hessian-fly is well-known to farmers as a serious pest of cereal crops; during the present season it has caused the loss of millions of bushels in the United States. In Western Canada its depredations fortunately have not attained the extent experienced in other regions of the continent and in order to be able to advise the farmers in the western provinces the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture have investigated this insect. The results of this investigation, which was conducted by Mr. Noman Griddle for several years, have now been published by the Department in a bulletin entitled "The Hessian Fly and the Western Wheat Stem Sawfly in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta." The bulletin is illustrated and may be obtained free on application to the Chief Officer, Publications.
