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Presentation To Mr. D. J. McDonald

The postal employees of the local office met at Loneragan's Restaurant Tuesday night, the occasion being an elaborate banquet and an address and presentation to Mr. Daniel J. McDonald who is retiring after forty-six years of faithful and meritorious service. Upwards of forty brother clerks, and others, gathered around the festive board with Mr. E. R. Healey presiding.

After doing justice to the sumptuous feast prepared in Mr. Loneragan's excellent style, Mr. J. J. Dunlop on behalf of the postal employees read the address which is appended, after which many appropriate speeches were delivered. Mr. J. W. Hughes speaking for the postal clerks paid high tribute to Mr. McDonald. He referred in passing to Mr. McDonald's enviable reputation as a postal employee, his remarkable record in the sphere of athletic endeavors, and his outstanding worth as a citizen and a Man.

Other speakers including Messrs O. R. Crabbe, J. A. Griffith, L. E. Arsenault and G. W. Beers also spoke in the highest terms with reference to Mr. McDonald's worth. The good time broke up at a late hour after many songs, recitations and choruses were heartily enjoyed.

The following is the address. Charlottetown P. E. I. (March 29th, 1926. To D. J. McDonald, Esq., Postal Clerk, Charlottetown.

Dear Mr. McDonald: Having learned that you are soon to retire from the Civil Service of Canada with which you have been associated during many years, we the members of the staff of the Charlottetown Post Office and Railway Mail Service take this opportunity to convey to you, in a small measure our earnest appreciation of you as a fellow worker.

On August the 28th, 1880 you entered the service as a Junior clerk in the Charlottetown Post Office. Here you remained until the year 1886, when you were transferred to the Railway Mail Service. In those days the means of travel were so inadequate that they entailed great hardship and inconvenience to men in this service. Many tremendous changes have taken place since then. Inventions have revolutionized every day life. Distances have been practically annihilated and wonderful improvements have been made in all services. Here we are now receiving the benefits of a modern Car-Ferry, Standard gas, Postal Cars and better working conditions for the employees.

Deeply interested in all manly sports you at once inscribed your name in the athletic roll of honor. Entering the contests with a clean and vigorous constitution, you experienced no difficulty in carrying off the prize of victory. The record of your achievements show that you played your part so fair and honorable in every event, as to win the admiration and just praise of your fellow-men.

After serving some twenty five years in the Railway Mail Service you again entered the Charlottetown Post Office where by your

courtesy and pleasing disposition you endeared yourself to every member of the staff. Being a very active and conscientious worker, you always could find some necessary work to do. It may be fully said of you, that you never purposely shirked your duty. Never avoided difficult tasks. Never selected easy performances but faced unflinchingly the work that lay before you to do.

"Service to the Public" became the chief aim of your endeavour and to attain this purpose you have given the best years of your life. You have endured hardships, made sacrifices and received little appreciation, but it is a pleasure to know that you steadfastly esteem duty above reputation and the approval of conscience more than men's praise.

We shall miss you Dan from your usual place in the office. We shall miss your pleasant intercourse, your good fellowship and more than this we shall lose a true, honest, upright fellow-worker.

We now kindly ask you to accept this small gift as a token of high esteem in which we regard you.

The pipe which is a symbol of peace and contentment while the cane we desire you to carry when exercising in your usual long walks are a fond remembrance of pleasant associations in the Charlottetown Post Office.

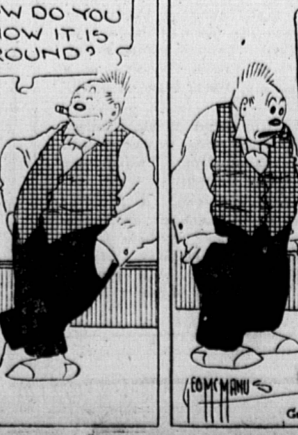
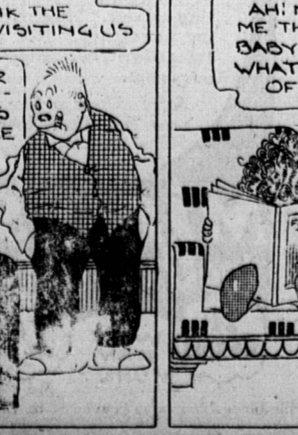
