"GERMANS CUTTING PRICES FOR CANADIAN TRADE."

The Council of the Montreal Board of Trade has received from two prominent shipping and forwarding firms in London, letters calling attention to the fact that German shipping and forwarding houses are prosecuting in Canada and Great Britain a campaign with a view to securing business between Great Britain and the Over-seas. The representations made show that the German houses, who have their head offices in Berlin and branch offices at all the ports in Great Britain are, through their agents in Canada, circulating business houses in Canada, offering to attend to the shipments and look after the consignments very much below what is reasonable and fair figure for such services. These German houses are offering to make contracts for a year or more with Canadians generally are patriotic enough to refrain from giving their custom to German houses, fears that the circulation of this business represent German houses is not always made known and hence it is desirable that enquiry should be made by all Canadian firms as to the nationality of firms representing by parties soliciting their shipping and forwarding business.

GERMANS PETRIFFED BY THE SHELL FUMES

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Telegraphing from Paris, Reuters's correspondent says: "That the fumes of the famous French 3-inch shell have a most deadly effect in an enclosed space is shown by a scene that met the eyes of the French penetrating a chateau occupied by the Germans, and which they had just bombarded. Entering a drawing room they found a company of Wurtembergians petrified in action. Some were at the windows taking aim with their fingers still pressing the trigger, while others were at the tables, where they had been playing games, with cards in their hands, while still others had cigarettes in their lips. An officer stood with his mouth open as if in the act of dictating an order. All the corpses looked absolutely life-like."
