Work Proceeding On New Health Centre

Construction work on the addition to the new Health Centre of old Polyclinic building is proceeding steadily and the men are now engaged in erecting the framework on the second floor. The exterior of the building is not expected to be completed for another two months. The building will house a basement, first and second floor. No work has been done on the exterior of the addition.
