Rev. W. V. Higgins, field secretary of the Baptist Foreign Missions of the Maritime Provinces, delivered a most interesting illustrated lecture at Alberton on Friday evening in the Baptist Church. His subject was "Everyday Life in India" and he dealt with it in an able manner. Mr. Higgins went to India as a missionary in 1889 and expects to return after a time. About one hundred views were shown. They carried the audience through the Mission field which lies on the East coast of the India among the Telugus people. The toms of the people showing their temples, idols etc. and also the progress of Christianity. Among other things the Rev. lecturer said that Christianity had already made vast changes in the conditions of India. There are 8,000,000 Christians in India counting Romanists. There are between three and four thousand missionaries working in that land. The population of India is 300,000,000. There are 200,000,000 who follow the Hindu religion. Mohamadans number 63,000,000. Buddhists number 10,000,000. The lepers which number 350,000 are largely cared for. Lepers homes have been established by various missionary societies and 7,000 lepers are at present in these homes. In the Maritime Baptist mission during the past year there has been a wonderful in-gathering from among the Padias, a class of people who travel as merchants among the hills. Thirty two of them were baptised and many others seem likely to follow.
