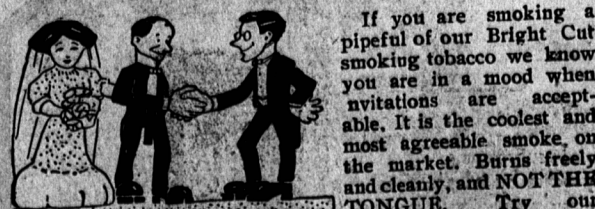

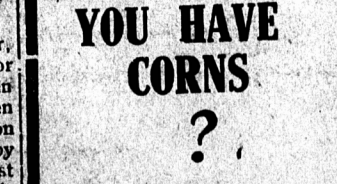

A. S. and Mrs. Prowse, Sydney, who have been visiting in Charlottetown, have returned home.

The Morwenna is expected to be put on the New York route at the close of navigation.—Sydney Exe.—The Morwenna is well known in this port and is due in Charlottetown about Thursday next.

J. E. Bell of the firm of Buntan and Bell, Charlottetown, has been appointed organist for the new Zion Church. This new organ is now ready, and is to be installed in their splendid new building in the near future.

The City of Sydney, which is due in Sydney from Montreal, is expected to make two more round trips before the navigation season closes.

A successful meeting of the children's Aid Society was held in Charlottetown Monday evening, Dr Conroy occupying the chair.

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Steaming at an average speed of fourteen knots and making the trip of 600 miles thru those almost unknown, and much shunned waters between Cape Chidley and Belle Isle, the Canadian Government steamer Minto, under command of Captain F. Anderson arrived in Halifax this morning.

The Minto is the proud possessor of two records both for speed in return and lateness of stay in the Arctic regions; and had she not encountered a heavy southerly gale in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, she would have been able to tie up in Halifax on Sunday morning, making the entire trip from Cape Chidley to this port in less than four days.

Those who look askance at voyages to that region will stand more than amazed when they learn that the Minto's Captain and crew found November a splendid month there, and could have sailed at least three weeks longer had it not been for the fact that shortage of fuel compelled them to put out for home.

On the trip down they encountered no ice, save one small berg; this, thanks to the splendid navigation qualities of Captain Anderson himself, who chose a route about 100 miles off shore to avoid this danger feature, and which route may from this time on be regarded as the official one.

The Minto sailed from Halifax on July 24th, her purpose being to conduct a series of further surveys to the approaches to Fort Nelson in line with the construction work of the new Hudson's Bay railway. This survey work was carried on until September 28th, at which date the steamer was forced to leave, owing to shortness of fuel. Otherwise she would have remained to take advantage of at least three weeks longer.

The S. S. Halifax from Boston, via Port Hawkesbury and Halifax, arrived in Charlottetown at eight o'clock last evening. She carried a very large freight but few passengers.

The Tignish accommodation arrived in Charlottetown yesterday at 12.05 p. m., twenty-five minutes late, the eastern accommodation on at 6.00 p. m., forty minutes late and the Tignish express at 10.15 p. m., twenty-five minutes late.

Yesterday the Northumberland arrived in Pictou from Charlottetown at 11.00 a. m. She left again about 2.55 p. m. with passengers, express, mail and freight and arrived at 6.15 p. m. She leaves to-day at 7.30 a. m. for Pictou, returning about 5.30 p. m.

The following prices were secured on the Charlottetown market square yesterday and have prevailed since last Friday.—White oats, 40 to 42c; black oats, 42 to 45c; potatoes, 25 to 30c; beef (quarter), per lb, 7 to 9c; beef (small), per lb, 10 to 16c.

The prices quoted by the wholesalers are:—Potatoes, 25 to 38c; hay, 50 to 60c; white oats, 40 to 42c; black oats, 42 to 44c; straw, \$5.50 to \$6.50.

On Sunday Nov. 10th the services in the Methodist Churches of the Murray Harbor Circuit were conducted by the Rev. George Steel, who is travelling in the interests of the Supremacy Fund of the N. B. and P. E. Island Conference.

As Mr. Steel was stationed on the Island at one time, and has visited Murray Harbor on two occasions previous to this, he comes to some of the people as an old friend, and they wish him success in his work.—Com.

On November 12th, 1849, just sixty-three years ago yesterday, Islanders purchased and loaded the Brig Fanny, which left Charlottetown for California, via Cape Horn.

After a voyage of seven and a half months the Fanny arrived at San Francisco in June 1850, where the vessel and cargo were sold. Each of the owners, after getting his share of the price, went his way, some to the mines, and others remaining in the city.

At that time cholera was raging there. Captain Irving, one of the shareholders, contracted the disease and died. Out of all the forty shareholders, we know of but one alive at the present time, namely, our respected citizen, J. H. Gates, now well up in years.

The only other survivor of the Fanny is Duncan McGougan of Malpeque, one of the sailors.—Pat.

MAY WEAR BRYCE MANTLE. LONDON, Nov. 11.—The Washington correspondent of the Morning Post says that Ambassador Bryce informed President Taft that he would retire shortly and devote himself to literature.

Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, now British Minister at Stockholm, will succeed Mr. Bryce.

Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice was born in 1859, and was created K. C. M. G. in 1906. He has served at Stockholm, as Minister, since September 1, 1908.

In 1886 he was acting Third Secretary, at Washington, and as Secretary to the British Delegates to the International Maritime Conference, August 27, 1889.

After serving for a time at Brussels and Tokio, he was transferred to Washington in 1893. He was Charge d'Affaires at Teheran in 1900, and Minister to Persia in 1906-8, and is considered one of the best of Great Britain's regular diplomats.

MILLIONAIRE'S WILL IS BEING CONTESTED. LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 11.—The contest over the will of Frank H. Holyoke, involving an estate estimated at \$1,000,000 and with ramifications extending from Maine to California, came up in court here today for trial. The present contest, which followed a similar battle already on

in the courts of Maine, was brought by a son of the deceased millionaire, Rev. Sydney A. Holyoke, whose home is in Milwaukee.

Frank H. Holyoke was a wealthy lumberman of Bangor, Me. He came to California for his health and died at Pasadena a year ago last October. In his will he cut off the widow with \$100,000 and gave each of his two sons \$100,000.

Both sons had little to do with their father for several years. When their father made his will, the lumberman made his will with lack of filial devotion and justified his treatment of his wife by the statement that he

had already affected a settlement with her under the terms of which she was to receive certain property in satisfaction of all claims against the estate. The entire estate, with the exception of \$50,000 bequeathed to Bangor philanthropies, was left to two nieces, Madeline and Marjorie Holyoke, of Bangor.

In his notice of contest, the Rev. Sydney A. Holyoke alleges that the will was not signed by his father, and that it was drafted by "certain designing persons residing at Pasadena," while his father was mentally unbalanced.
