**FINANCE MINISTER TO DECIDE THEIR FATE**

LONDON, Jan. 5.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King has written to the committee representing the Grand Trunk shareholders, stating that the memorial which they recently forwarded will be considered by him when Hon. W. S. Fielding, now in London, returns to Ottawa. This is accepted as an indication that it will be for Mr. Fielding to decide whether the shareholders are to receive the compassionate treatment that they have asked for. Mr. Fielding recently received a deputation of the G.T.R. shareholders, but what he told them has not been divulged. Your correspondent is informed that the most favorable intimation which they have yet received from Canadian official sources is that if the Grand Trunk ever becomes a success and indemnifies the Canadian Government for all the public money that has been sunk in it, the losses of the shareholders will then be sympathetically considered.

**ELEPHANTS TOBoggANING**

LONDON, Jan. 6.—A couple each of whom had only one leg, happily hobbled into the Lewisham Registrar's office, where they were married last week. Robert Payne was the bridegroom who lost his leg at Ypres in 1917 with the West Kents. He appeared on crutches. The bride, Miss Alice Smith, who was pretty, wore an artificial leg as the result of an accident when a child. Her infirmity was hardly noticeable.

**Will Continue To Inspect Immigrants**

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—Inspection of intending immigrants before they embark at European ports for Canada will be continued by officials of the Department of Immigration. It was announced to the representatives of the transportation companies at their conference today with Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of immigration and colonization. The transportation companies asked that this system be dispensed with.

### BUFFALO AND TIGER FIGHTING

A favorite and national spectacle among the people of Java is the combat between the buffalo and the tiger. A large cage of bamboo, or wood, is erected, the ends of which are fixed into the ground, into which the buffalo is first, and the tiger afterwards admitted, through openings reserved for the purpose. It seldom falls that the buffalo is triumphant; and one buffalo has been known to destroy several full grown tigers in succession.

In these combats the buffalo is generally stimulated by the constant application of boiling water, which is poured over him from the upper part of the cage, and nettles which are fastened to the end of a stick, and applied by persons seated in the same quarter. The tiger sometimes springs upon the buffalo at once; he veers generally, however, avoids the combat, until goaded by sticks, and aroused by the application of burning straw, when he moves round the cage, and being gored by the buffalo, seizes him by the neck, head or leg. The buffalo is often dreadfully torn and seldom survives the combat many days.

In these entertainments the Javans are accustomed to compare the buffalo to the Javan and the tiger to the European, and it may be readily imagined with what eagerness they look to the success of the former. The combat generally lasts from twenty minutes to half an hour, when, if neither of them is destroyed, the animals are changed, and the tiger, if he survives, is released to be destroyed in the manner called rampong, which is as follows:

On receiving information of the retreat of a tiger, the male inhabitants are sometimes called out in a body, by the order of a chief, each man being obliged to be provided with a spear, the common weapon of the country. The place where the animal is concealed is surrounded; double or triple range being formed, according to the number of hunters, and he is roused by shouts, by the beating of drums, or by fire. The place where he is expected to attempt his escape is carefully guarded and he is generally speared on the spot.

### TORTOISES AS WATER PITCHERS

Quite recently a ship from the southern seas reached Tacoma, Wash., with a very large specimen of a tortoise on board. As this lay upon the wharf some one looking closely on its brown back, saw letters upon it and clearing away the barnacles which had matted upon it made out the letters, "British ship Sea-Bride, Aug. 12, 1877 S. S. S. W." That would refer to an island in the South Pacific forty five years ago. The creature weighed about seven hundred pounds. In their native haunts the tortoise only leaves the sea to lay its eggs a hundred at a time a nestful being about three hundred, which are hatched by the sun. Another relative of this family the tortoise lives either on land or in water, is a vegetable feeder, and is a heavy drinker of fresh water. This variety has an internal cistern in which it carries a large reservoir of water, and for which it is often killed by natives of the southern islands upon some of which fresh water is very scarce. This animal lives to be three hundred years old, some naturalists think to an even greater age.
