Stock Markets At A Glance

WINNIPEG, April 7 (CP)—For the third consecutive session May and July futures advanced the five cent limit in trading on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, Saturday. CHICAGO, April 7 (AP)—The strongest demand in many weeks Saturday pushed May rye up the five-cent daily limit allowed by exchange regulations to the highest price for the contract in 26 years. Out prices also scored their broadest gains in several weeks, on the strength of the strong, steady rye demand. NEW YORK, April 7 (AP)—The stock market Saturday concluded another recovery week with the industrial averages hitting a 16-year high but with many rails, utilities and assorted pivots in lower ground. Irregularity ruled from the start of the brief session. Dealings picked up at intervals and traders of 6500 shares were the largest for Saturday since Feb. 16. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up a point and 79.4 where it was exactly one point under the 15-year top of last Feb. 2. Rails were off 3 and utilities in lower ground. The overall average showed a net gain of 1.6 points on the week.

..Cheese Dishes..

To stretch her food dollar as far as possible and yet give her family all that is required for daily, happy living, is the goal of every enterprising homemaker. Her best friend in this regard is cheese. It is a concentrated and truly economical food with which there need be no waste, for every crumb is edible. From time to time an appetizing, tangy cheese dish is welcomed as the main course served at luncheon, supper and even dinner. Canadian cheese has a characteristic flavor which appeals to most people and makes easy the preparation of meatless dishes. There are many different ways in which cheese may be incorporated into the daily menus. The home economists of the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture suggest that it be used in sauces, croquettes, omelets, souffles, casseroles, rabelets and other supper dishes as Cheese Fondue or Macaroni and Cheese. To off-set the concentrated nature of cheese thoroughly, add served melted butter, and seasonings. Beat until mixture is smooth. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored, then mix with the mixture. Fold in egg whites, which have been beaten until stiff, but not dry. Turn into a well-greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven, 350°F, for 40 minutes. Serve with a crisp salad. Six servings.

SMUGGLING FLOWERS BOOMS IN ANTIPODES

SYDNEY, Australia, April 7 (CP)—Smuggling tactics are being used to get large quantities of protected Australian wildflowers on to the Sydney market, according to Kurung-Gang Chief Ranger V. Wallace. Kurung-Gang is a vast, natural bushland reserve on the banks of the Hawkesbury River near Sydney. Ranger Wallace says the smugglers have assembly depots in obscure vans along the rocky river banks. Boatmen rendezvous to pick up their cargo at night and slip down the broad river to less conspicuous dispersal points.
