It will be remembered that the expedition in Thibet is proceeding under the supreme direction of Lord Kitchener, the Commander in Chief of the British army in India. This may serve to give assurance that all requisite preparations have been made and nothing overlooked in the necessary equipment of the force. According to the latest available reports, Gen. Macdonald, who is in immediate command of the military expedition (with Col. Young as his second in command) has at his disposal a force of almost 5,000 fighting men. These include a British mountain battery and an Indian battery, giving him four seven-pounder guns and five other field pieces, not including some Maxim guns. The difficulties of transport, which are great, are provided for by a force of carriers and transport men, 7,600 in number, 7,500 animals and 700 carts. This gives the impression of quite a formidable supply train for a fighting force of 5,000, the total numbers aggregating 12,000 men of the combined fighting and transport service. There is little wonder that it should appear to the Thibetans more like an army of invasion than a diplomatic mission. That better rifles and cannon were found in the possession of the natives in the last than in the earlier engagements is held to mean that the better Thibetan troops and arms have been brought to the front from Lhasa. Some of the rifles and field guns are of Russian manufacture, but may have been bought in the regular way years ago. It may be remembered that the Mullah's forces in Somaliland obtained many rifles through Italian Somaliland, but it was never charged that the Italian Government was responsible for this business as the Italians were entirely friendly to British interests.

The New York World has collected figures which show that by the shrinkage of trade, transportation and manufacture in the United States 655,000 men are now out of employment. It finds also that the shrinkage will probably go on until twice this number are included in the list of those out of work. Bank clearings and railway earnings for May showed a heavy decline as compared with May of last year.

PREMIER COMBES

That the world is a stage on which men are players, one man in his time playing many parts, is well illustrated in the career of Emile Combes, now Premier of France. Seventy years ago when he was born in the little village of Pons, his father kept an inn and wine shop opposite the church. He was educated at a religious seminary. After five years the Archbishop's favor sent the bright youth to the Assumptionist College at Nîmes, and there "Abbe" Combes won honors for his religious theses. But he soon came to prefer teaching to the more exclusively religious duties of the priesthood. While teaching he fell in love, wrote an impassioned note of seven words, "I adore you. Do you love me?", and was presently married to the woman of his choice. That was forty years ago. At his marriage he had agreed with his mother-in-law—this relative-by-marriage is a power in France—to become a physician, and for six months of the year, when not attending to his legislative duties he has practised. The brass plate on the Pons cottage reads, "Combes, Docteur Medecin." Almost idolized by the people of Pons, he has been mayor of the village for more than forty years. He was fired upon by an Anarchist in Marseilles some years ago. His supporters affirm that he is not hostile to religion, notwithstanding his severe measures against the religious teaching orders. Only a year ago he spoke eloquently in favor of the budget for the support of the churches and clergy, declaring that he thought religious instruction necessary for the children of France. His policy is directed not against the priest in the pulpit but against the monk in the schoolroom. When his predecessor Waldeck Rousseau retired from the Premiership and he was called to lead and form a new ministry it was on Thursday night. He worked diligently and his ministry was complete on Saturday morning. Congratulated on his success and diligence he replied, "Yes, I have found a ministry; but I have lost my umbrella." Since then many "storms" have beaten on his head. He has thoroughly offended the Vatican and he has made the great far-reaching settlement with Britain. Still with all his assumed gaiety, he must realize that every man sometimes needs an umbrella.

The St. Petersburg press is bitterly angry to learn that a submarine torpedo boat built in the United States and recently sold to Japan has been shipped on a Norwegian vessel and is now on its way to the east. It is reported that other submarines have been purchased in the States but not yet shipped. The case may be yet as serious as was that of the A. Abama forty years ago. A few months hence we shall hear of the doings of this submarine, now known as the Protector.
