NEW BRANCH TO OPEN.—In the heart of the business section of Rio de Janeiro, on that imposing thoroughfare, the Avenida Rio Branco, The Canadian Bank of Commerce will open in the near future their first Brazilian branch. ## Mt. Stewart Electors Hear Candidates

### Good Meeting of Electors Give Splendid Reception to Political Aspirants.

The Queen's County candidates were well received on Friday night at Mt. Stewart, the large hall there being filled to capacity. Perfect order was maintained throughout the evening and every speaker received an attentive hearing. Mr. H. F. Feehan ably presided.

MR. J. E. SINCLAIR expressed his satisfaction with the manner in which the campaign is being conducted. So far it has been marked by strong political discussion almost void of personal attack. The tariff question, he maintained, cannot be settled once and for all. He intended to continue to press the claims of the Maritime Provinces, if elected in regard to the Migratory Birds Act so that the regulations may be adjusted so as to deal fairly with these provinces and particularly P. E. Island. He took up his criticism of the government's expenditure during the war and urged freer trade with the United States as the only safe policy for Canada. He touched upon the railway question, criticizing the system of interest-bearing directors, and concluding with an eulogistic review of the personnel of the Liberal Party.

MR. DONALD MCKINNON the next speaker, referring to the career of Mr. MacKenzie King who had been eulogized by Mr. Sinclair, asked whether it was true that he was during the war part of the time in the United States in the employ of Rockefeller at a salary of \$25,000. In an able review of the tariff issue, Mr. McKinnon presented the policy of the Meighen government and disposed of the opposition arguments. They make out they are going to try to remove some of our duties from the States, he said. But their policy is not now a policy of reciprocity. The Republican party in the United States has elected a president pledged to a high tariff and the American farmers will be protected whether we take off our tariff or not. The Liberals want Canada to pay the whole tariff, while we under our system make the Americans pay part of ours. Defending the government's railway policy, the speaker pointed out that under the present board of management there is an audit made by the board the same way

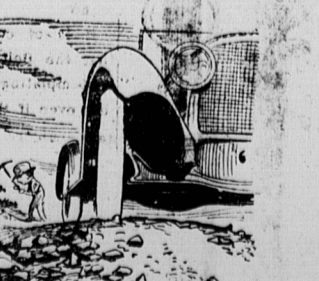
