NEW YORK, July 26-(AP)-Selected stocks enjoyed a pint-sized rally in today's market as Wall Street exhibited a little more optimism for business prospects and less nervousness over the European war.

Most issues in the Canadian section were inactive with a few stocks showing gains. International Nickel advanced one point and Ford, Imperial Oil and Lake Shore fractions in the bond market Canada 48 gained 3-4 points.

Volume of 272,814 shares was the largest of the week.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues held a net advance of 1 1/2 points at 414.

Market sentiment was exemplified by the fact this composite a month ago stood at 413.

Retaining portions of their morning showing gains, Chrysler, General Motors, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, General Electric, Texas Corp, Great Northern, Western Union, International Nickel, Pressed Steel Car and White Rock.

Underwater were Du Pont, Westinghouse, U. S. Steel, Eastman, N. Y. Central, Loft and Eastman Kodak.

MONTREAL, July 26-(CP)-Leaders closed on the upside today as the stock market met moderate buying that sent many issues up fractions to a point or more.

General Motors, preferred, scored a gain of 1 1/2 points while sizeable fractional advances were boarded by Bathurst, Price Brothers, and St. Lawrence Corporation.

Issues for business preferred, and Fractional improvement was noted for Brazilian and Shawinigan although Montreal Power sold off 3-4.

Noranda gained two points while Nickel held steady. Dominion Coal preferred gained a point.

Total sales: 47,400 shares; Industrials 6,000; Mines 41,400; Bonds \$2,000.

TORONTO, July 26-(CP)-Mining stock stepped forward to stage a considerable rally in the Toronto final hour today on the Toronto market. Volume was 128,000 shares.

Prices bulged on the rise and all groups closed well up for the day except the western oils.

Gold shares had an index gain of 1 1/4 in base metals. Steep Rock closed with a gain of 20 cents.

East Malartic recorded an advance of 20 cents and several other golds, including San Antonio, Teck Hughes, Buffalo-Ankerite and Wright-Hargreaves, firmed 10 to 20 cents. Hallnor added 50 cents and gains of 3 to 7 cents were netted by Malartic Gold Fields, Preston, Macassa, Kerr-Addison, Kirkland Lake, MacLeod-Cockshutt, O'Brien and Pickle Crow. Lake Shore firmed a half point.

The London market does not appear to be a very favorable spot for future sales of silver fox, at least not for domestic use as the British government has recently placed a tax of 24 1/2% on furs.

Licenses will be issued by the Board of Trade for the importation of furs from dollar countries such as the United States and Canada.

Specified goods are required for re-exportation by manufacture into merchandise intended for export.

This move is part of a general scheme to continue all conservation of British dollar resources for permanent purchases. What affect it will have on the fur trade is not in a position to state.

Very probably they will not be interfered with as a great deal of that class of goods is re-exported to the Empire. European markets will be definitely out, however, and that will curtail sales very materially.

Herbert A. Nieman & Company of Michigan will offer approximately 15,000 silver fox pelts at auction in New York September 19th and 20th. They will be mainly full silvers.

On the occasion of two months ago when one of his wife's face was lost his tongue, bitten off by another fox through the wire. The difficulty was to feed the animal, but Frank was equal to the occasion, taking the usual feed mixture, opening the fox's mouth and placing a clamp in it he administered the feed in the same way as if pilling the fox.

That was the end of the matter and the fox is looking splendid and has now learned to feed himself.

Officers of the United States Customs seized \$25,000 worth of silver fox furs in Detroit, Michigan, the night of July 6th. The inspectors followed a cruiser launch over from the Canadian side and boarded the boat when it docked at Detroit. Inspection disclosed five large burlap bags containing several hundred silver fox pelts.

The two men in the boat, were arrested by a third man waiting on the pier with a car to receive the pelts got away scot free.

Harry J. LaDue is chairman of an organization committed to planning a large co-operative food and fur ranch on the north shore of Lake Superior. The tract of land consists of 640 acres and is owned by the Canadian National Railway of Duluth. It will be divided into suitable lots for modern sized ranches and fur farmers who wish to operate on a larger scale may acquire additional lots.

Material savings are expected to be effected through the building and operation of co-operative refrigerator and food preparation plant, also as the result of buying animal foods in quantity. The situation is excellent for the production of good colour fur, and providing there is not too much overhead should be a paying proposition.

The writer has often contended that Summerside and Charlottetown, and in fact any large centre of fox farming, should have a large co-operative food preparing plant where enough food could be mixed to take care of anywhere between 3,000 and 5,000 foxes. This could be sent in buckets by truck to the various member ranches providing they are not at too great

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TIMELY NOTES ON TOPICS

Silver Fox Farming
All across the 90% silver fox was a feature of the Seattle, Washington, Fur Exchange Sale July 19th. Blue fox declined 5%.

In our own ranch we have quite often prepared feed for as many as 2,700 foxes, but at present are reduced to some 1,543. We are confident that with large buying power and proper method of preparation and feeding, great savings could be effected.

Owing to the demand for bologna meat and increased prices being paid for good beef, ranchers who have been in the habit of feeding fresh meat are having difficulty in getting supplies. This season we have fed less fresh meat than any year we can remember, but have not experienced any bad results as yet from the change to more cold storage meat. Our principal reason for buying the fresh meat is to get bone to grind in with the feed.

However, most fox feeds contain a certain amount of horse meal which probably takes care to a considerable extent of calcium requirements and then again a lot of ranchers feed fish which has a very high calcium percentage.

They are going in for rabbit breeding extensively in England, not as pets, however, but to increase the food supply. Five thousand copies of various bulletins on rabbits have been issued and they include full particulars on the marketing of rabbit meat and pelts.

Marten are on the road to extinction and intense efforts are being made to study the habits of this little animal in order to endeavor to ranch them. Some success has been made but not enough to stamp this new type of fur farming as profitable. At the last census there were eleven marten farms and two fisher farms in Canada. These produced 100 young martens and 26 young fisher.

There is a great deal to Mr. Hemming's theory that we should keep goats in this province. After number of experiments it has been found that four goats requiring only half the amount of food will give as much milk as one cow. In Switzerland goat's milk is used quite extensively on fox farms.

Today we present to our readers the third and concluding installment of the proceedings of the Prince Edward Island Silver Fox Breeders and Exhibitors' Association Field Day held at Summerside, which has been so well reported by our friend P. J. Williams of the Canadian National Fox Breeders' Association.

"A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Callbeck for his address and for the privileges extended to visiting ranchers inviting their examination of "Royal" foxes and of the sheds, pens and equipment in use on the ranch.

On the invitation of Chairman Hancock the attending visitors repaired to the Ohio National Ranch owned by Mr. Hancock. Here as at the ranch we had just left everyone was invited to examine all parts of the ranch to inspect the foxes. Mr. Hancock has a minute and well-organized method of keeping records of feeding, etc. This he explained in detail after distributing sample record sheets among the ranchers present.

At this ranch Mr. Hancock showed us a convenient feeding contrivance which is being used, and found very satisfactory, on the ranch of Mr. P. G. Clark, and also what we consider an especially cheap and handy gadget for the

watering of foxes. This gadget makes it plain that it is not necessary to hang costly water dishes on wires where the foxes can paw the wire out. Mr. Hancock's water dish is an ordinary round shallow dish that can be removed, emptied and washed and securely replaced with fresh water in five seconds. Of the various feed mixtures which Lowell outlined, with remarks on the results, we here present two that he says he found satisfactory.

Feed combinations used on growing pups from June 10th, 1939.
