UNEARTHED BIG ROMAN CEMETERY

LEITCHWORTH, HERTFORDSHIRE, England, Nov. 29 — (CP) — W Percival Westell, 29, curator of Leitchworth museum and supervisor of excavating work in 1928 which unearthed a Roman cemetery at Baldock, died here.

The cemetery, covering nearly 1,000 square yards, yielded 320 grave groups, including one with a curse—a leaden tablet pierced with nine holes. In five of the holes iron nails had been inserted. The piercing was stated to indicate the "fixing" power of the curse, which paralyzes its victim, depriving him of the strength of life.

South African Letter

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 29 — (CP) — Negotiations for a reciprocal aid agreement with the United States have resulted in an agreement on major principles, the department of national affairs of the Union of South Africa has announced. It was hoped a final agreement would be reached in the near future.

The main purpose of the agreement, said the announcement, is the formal acceptance by South Africa of the principles enunciated in the Anglo-American agreement of February, 1942, in the terms of which lendlease assistance hitherto had been obtained by South Africa from the United States and the formal arrangement for reciprocal aid by the Union to the United States.

Final negotiations at the 26th anniversary of the Russian revolution, said the Moscow conference meant the removal of Soviet restrictions and the shortening of the war.

Hon. J. H. Hofmeyr, acting prime minister, speaking at the annual dinner of the Anglo-American conference recently, Prime Minister J. C. Smuts said there were clear indications of a mellowing process at work in the political life of South Africa. People were beginning to understand and bear in mind one another after four years of war and the way in which they had dealt with one another during the war was going to be helpful in building up the young South African Union nation imbued with a sense of justice, fair play and a mutual respect for each other's language and cultural rights.

Final provincial council election results reveal government parties have 122 seats out of a total of 170 for all four provinces. The Nationalists have a total of 48 seats.

In Cape province the United Party gained 51 seats, Malmesbury, Victoria West, Worcester and Ceres from the Nationalists. The Nationalists won Alberton, the New Order, and Swellendam from the United Party. Labor won East London City, also in the Dominion Party.

The final analysis shows the United Party gained 12 seats in the Transvaal while the Nationalists lost four. In Cape, the government majority increased by 13 and the Nationalists lost 13. In the Transvaal Provincial Council executive and the representation reduced by one-half in Cape.

NAVY HONORED IN NEWS VERSES

LONDON, cv. 29 — (CP) — Written by poet Laureate John Masefield, verses in honor of men of the Royal Navy were recited by Lord Edmund Knight at Trafalgar Day celebrations in Trafalgar Square, Knight, one of Britain's favorites, was partially blinded while serving as an officer in the Prince of Wales in the action against the Bismarck in May, of 1941.

The verses read: "Long since, I knew the sailors of the Fleet, The Nation's Lionhearts, the undismayed. Death's suddenness, most dreadful, could meet. As an old shipmate who a visit paid. Ocean has added to her death since the. Science and purer courage are her need; Men grown in skill, deadlier to men; These, with grown virtue, dare the greater deed."

Nelson's revered prayer before Trafalgar was read by the chaplain of the fleet, Archdeacon J. K. Wilson and wreaths placed at the foot of the Nelson Column including one from two great-granddaughters of Lord Nelson.
