Another inducement is given to the applicants to take the examinations. The time spent at the School will be credited to those passing the test towards the Rural Science Diploma, which brings considerable financial advantage to those who secure it.

Every county ought to have its own school for the teacher from that county, who stands highest in the examinations. Public-spirited men and women must see the good which is bound to come from teachers giving nearly a month to preparation for their year's work.

What generous citizen in each county will make it possible for one teacher to get a chance to do more good for her school at a not too great expense? Mr. J. D. Seaman, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Secretary-treasurer of the School will be glad to hear from any who wish to share in the good work.

In pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island made and passed in the 3rd year of the reign of His present Majesty King Edward VII., Chapter 17, intitled "An Act to Consolidate and Amend the several Acts incorporating the City of Charlottetown."

WEDNESDAY The 9th day of February, A. D. 1910

At the several places, that is to say In Ward 1, at or near the house of F. McKenna, Queen Street, near Water.

In Ward 2, at or near the house of Mrs. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Heurtz's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Street.

In Ward 3, at or near the Market House, in Ward 4, at or near City Hall, corner of Kent and Queen Streets.

In Ward 5, East at or near Mrs. Heustis' Shop on Great George Street.

In Ward 5, West at or near James McMahon's Shop on Great George Street.

At the said Election the Poll will be opened at Nine o'clock in the forenoon and continue open until Five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.
