General Approval of Arthur Griffith's Note

DUBLIN, March 20.—Approval is voiced generally in Dublin over the note which Arthur Griffith, president of the Daill Eiranna, sent to the ministry of defence Thursday in which he forbade the holding of the army convention, set for March 26.

The intention has been evident of submitting to the convention of the Irish republican army a resolute executive of the army and the provisional government. It was regarded this as a deliberate attempt to establish a military government.

The action of Mr. Griffith is looked upon as having again temporarily set aside the issue of the army trouble in Limerick, by some it is even considered that he has challenged a definite decision.

John MacIntee, addressing the anti-treaty meeting at Harold's Cross, yesterday, declared that the Irish republican army convention would be held despite Mr. Griffith's prohibition.

TRADE IN ARGENTINA

Weston, Canadian Trade Commissioner, Buenos Aires, reports that prospects for Canadian trade in the Argentine are brighter than for any time during the past year owing to the falling exchange rate and improved position of export trade and increasing number of inquiries for Argentine imports.

A Settlement Affecting 700,000 Operatives

LONDON, March 20.—A provision settlement has been reached in the building trades dispute affecting seven hundred thousand operatives. The men's representatives in conference with employers yesterday agreed to accept a graduated reduction of wages, modification of the number of hours of work per week, commencing April 1.

The employers proposed to extend the present 44-hour week to a maximum of 50 hours per week in summer with a shorter week in the winter.

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Ring Thieves Handled \$6,000,000 Worth of Goods

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 20.—Threats of merchandise from New York Central Railroad cars on an enormous scale resulted in the indictment today of railroad detectives, saloon keepers, merchants, and farmers, who are alleged to have made up a ring of thieves and "fences" that handled goods worth \$2,000,000 a year for the last three years.

The indictments were reported by a federal grand jury, which for ten days has been hearing evidence gathered by a force of New York Central investigators.

Whisky and alcohol comprised the chief loot of the ring during the last year, it was said by Peter J. Bentley, of New York, special attorney for the New York Central. Since January, 1921, twenty-three robberies of cars containing liquor have been reported, and the claims of these alone total \$750,000.

With the alleged connivance of railroad police, detailed to guard the trains, yardmasters, switchmen and other railroad employees, it was possible for thieves to remove goods from a car and reset it, so that the loading would not be discovered until the car arrived at its destination.

Cars Were Switched

The car selected for a job, Mr. Bentley said, would be taken out of a train and on to a switch easily approached by automobile track. After the car had been robbed, and the contents loaded in trucks, the seals would be replaced and the car put on an outbound train with no records of the robbery on the various station books.

This system, he said, made it difficult to locate the point at which the thefts occurred, and it required many weeks of work to point to the Buffalo and other Niagara frontier points as the probable center of operations.

Among the men indicted today were John J. Madoney, a former chief of the New York Central police force here, and several inspectors, lieutenants, and plain detectives, who were discharged several months ago in the early stages of the inquiry.

Because of the high prices and ready market for the stolen liquor, it is said that several alleged members of the ring have piled up tidy fortunes within a few months.

The bank book of one switchman under arrest showed a balance of \$9,000. Another is said to have played \$25,000 and had been living in princely style.

The airplanes made a two hundred mile flight each from Botwood over the Atlantic yesterday and located the main herd. Then they flew back to the fleet, descended and delivered their message and with some baby seals souvenirs, returned to Botwood.

Today the ships' captains are wondering how soon they will be able to leave their present position and get out to the big herd, for all the vessels were tightly jammed in the ice driven against the shore winds. The tail shaft of the steamer Diana was broken when her propeller struck a small ice berg.
